

454 PLANES USE MEDFORD'S PORT DURING AUGUST

Report To City Council Shows Receipts \$750.96—Sale of Lots Ordered.

In August 454 planes used Medford municipal airport, it was shown in a report submitted to the city council last night by Thomas A. Culbertson, Jr., airport superintendent. Airport receipts for the month were given as \$750.96.

The planes were classified as follows: 262 United Air Lines, 142 U. S. army, 48 private and 2 U. S. navy.

The 22 students of the Southern Oregon College of Education who began their civilian pilot training in June completed the ground and flight courses and were granted pilot certificates in August, the report said.

Japanese Fishermen Violate Agreement

Washington, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Senator Wallgren (D-Wash.) told Secretary Hull today Japanese fishing boats had violated an agreement not to fish in Alaskan waters and that a Japanese floating cannery had operated there this summer.

Wallgren said it was the first time since the agreement was made two years ago, that Japanese boats had fished in those waters. He added in his letter to Hull that "there is a possibility that they were there for some other purpose."

BUILD CHUTES FOR BUCKING BRONCOS AT FAIRGROUNDS

With seven bucking bronco chutes and several new bulldozing and half-rope chutes nearing completion at the fairgrounds park, things are rapidly being whipped into shape for the second annual Medford rodeo next Saturday and Sunday afternoons at 2:30 o'clock. Sawdust is being spread on the baseball diamond directly in front of the huge covered grandstand, and bleacher seats capable of accommodating over 1,000 spectators are being erected on the east side of the arena. Max Barbour, who is staging the two-day rodeo for the Medford Athletic association, said that the arena would be slightly smaller this year to give spectators a better view of all action.

The stock, Brahma bulls, bucking horses, Mexican steers and roping cattle, is arriving in town in a steady stream. It is being transported from Pendleton and Goldendale, Wash., in trucks.

One of the features of the rodeo will be the appearance of Si and Fanny, famous clowns with their trained mule, Abner. Abner, according to Barbour, is the greatest trained mule in the world, having played at the New York World's Fair in 1939 in addition to appearing on several radio programs and in New York night clubs.

The little mule is spic and span, wears rubber shoes when he enters buildings and has mastered 63 tricks, which include sitting on chairs, adding and subtracting and answering "yes" and "no" to questions, Barbour stated.

Si and Fanny Otis, who travel in a modern house trailer, stage their unique comedy act dressed as a farmer and his wife. Abner travels in his own truck, which has a specially constructed body.

GOVERNMENT AID FOR HERMISTON

Washington, Sept. 17.—(AP)—Presidential approval of 12 new defense public works projects, calling for expenditure of \$3,636,874 to provide community facilities necessary to the health, welfare and safety of defense workers for army and navy personnel, was announced today by John M. Carmody, federal works administrator.

Among the projects was: Hermiston, Ore., water works additions and improvements, \$98,134, and sewage system and disposal plant, \$109,680.

Frank Hull, city chairman, announced that one firm had offered to buy \$25 savings bonds for resale to its employees on an easy-payment, payroll-deduction plan.

Mr. Hull was also working on the suggestion that high school girls take charge of booths at industrial plants a couple of times a month. Speakers were being prepared to give brief talks on the defense savings bonds and stamps program at the plants and at other places where large numbers of persons can be assembled. E. C. Corn, chairman of the speakers bureau of the county committee, will have speakers ready next week.

SOUTH CAROLINA FOR F. R. BACKER

Columbia, S. C., Sept. 17.—(AP)—Governor Burnet R. Maybank, a consistent supporter of President Roosevelt's policies, appeared today the Democratic choice to fill the United States senate seat formerly held by Associate Justice James F. Byrnes of the supreme court.

Returns from 1,368 of the state's 1,520 precincts in yesterday's runoff gave Maybank an unofficial count of 89,419 and Olin D. Johnson, 67,752.

A general election has been set for September 30 but that is only a formality in South Carolina, where just about everybody is a Democrat.
