Automobile Ratio Among Oregonians Is 2.5 This Year

Salem, Sept. 18.—(AP)—There is one motor vehicle in Oregon for every 2.5 persons, with one private car to each 3.1 persons, Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.

Oregon's ratio last year of one private car to each 3.3 persons was third highest in the nation, California and Nevada leading with 2.8 and 3.1, respectively.

There are 422,210 vehicles of all kinds registered in the state, an increase of 10 per cent over a year ago. Of this number, 343,507 are private passenger cars.

Road Oiling Program Completed for Year; Weather Hampers Job

The road oiling program of Jackson county has been completed for the year. County Engineer Paul B. Rynning reported today. It will total about 12 miles, with portions in practically every section of the county.

Due to the cool weather not as much was done as planned, the county engineer said. Part of the Evans creek road was left unfinished and will be completed next year.

Besides the county oiling, work was performed for Jacksonville, Rogue River, Ashland and Medford.

Stock piles for emergency repairs of the roads during the winter are now being assembled.

Work was started today on grading and surfacing a portion

of Stewart avenue preparatory to oiling next spring. Grading and surfacing of the Old Stage road for oiling next year will be completed.

Grading and graveling of the county's share of Dead Indian road will be completed early next week and will then be ready for winter traffic.

Repair of a bridge over Big Butte creek a mile above McLeod has been started.
