

NAZIS RETALIATE AGAINST CHILEANS

Berlin, Sept. 18.—(P)—Several Chileans—the exact number undisclosed—have been arrested in Germany on suspicion of engaging in activities hostile to the reich, authoritative sources announced today.

Disclosure of the arrests was made in connection with a query concerning 27 Germans taken into custody in Chile.

Thirteen Germans, 10 alleged chiefs of Nazi cells and three officials of German business houses, were held for investigation at Santiago, Chile, last Thursday night. One of them, Otto Zippelius, was a former instructor to the Chilean army.

Meanwhile, according to some authorities, are close relatives of the arrested.

Charles H. Leach, Portland, chairman of the state Democratic committee, met at luncheon in the Hotel Medford this afternoon with Jackson county party leaders to discuss the new 4th congressional district convention in Roseburg October 4.

S. P. Cuts Trains On K. F. Division

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—(P)—The Southern Pacific announced today it would discontinue the northbound Oregonian between here and Portland for the winter.

The change, effective September 28, leaves the southbound Oregonian on the run. This means five trains will be in daily service northbound and six southbound.

The Cascade will leave San Francisco at 5 p. m. instead of 5:40 p. m.

The Oregonian and the Cascade are trains on the Klamath Falls division of the Southern Pacific. Time table changes effective here September 28 were announced a few days ago.

Taxpayer's Load Increased By New Revenue Legislation

Washington, Sept. 18.—(P)—Income taxes to be paid under the new \$3,553,400,000 revenue measure, now awaiting signing on President Roosevelt's desk, will double, triple or quadruple the amounts now paid by many.

Wife of Capitalist Suicides With Gun

Denver, Sept. 18.—(P)—A few minutes after she had asked a physician by telephone if drinking a quart of liquor would kill her, Mrs. Charles Boettcher II fatally shot herself with a .38 calibre revolver late yesterday. Deputy Coroner Gus Economy reported.

The attractive 37-year old blonde's husband was the Denver capitalist who was held by kidnappers for two weeks in February, 1933.

He was released March 1 from a South Dakota ranch hideaway after a bundle containing \$60,000 was tossed into a ditch near Denver for the abductors.

Mrs. Boettcher's body was found in her locked bedroom. Economy said Mrs. Boettcher apparently was despondent over ill health.
