All Conference Clubs See Action Coming Week-End

The annual autumn madness, otherwise known as the football season, will officially arrive in southern Oregon this week-end. All four Southern Oregon conference eleven will go to the post against competition of varying degrees of potency, and after the firing is completed fans will have some knowledge of how their favorite clubs figure to perform during the remainder of the campaign.

For Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass, games this week-end will mark their first of the 1941 season. For the fourth member of the loop, Klamath Falls, it will be the second start of the current schedule. Klamath opened with a 19 to 13 conquest of Chico, Cal., last Friday night.

Medford's Black Tornado, defending conference champs, will entertain the Weed, Cal., high school Cougars, and while little or nothing is known regarding the Californians, the locals are expected to open their season with a victory. It may be a tough battle and again it may not, but the Bowerman squad figures to cop against a team hailing from a school considerably smaller than the South Oakdale avenue institution.

Ashland high's Grizzlies will make their debut against the Lakeview Honkers Friday night on a fine new turf gridiron on Walter Phillips field in Ashland, and under a new coach, Frank O'Neal, former Pacific university athlete.

The Grizzlies will open the season with a veteran team averaging 157 pounds per man, the line scaling 160 and the backfield 152. Every position but right guard will be filled by a letterman. Lawrence Hall will be the lone non-stripe winner in the Grizzly starting line-up.

Incidentally, Russell Hawk, 190-pound 1940 Ashland center who attended Medford's Lake o' Woods training camp and had planned to transfer here, has returned to the Grizzly lair and apparently has given up his idea of coming to Medford. Hawk, because he missed most of the Ashland practice sessions, is listed on the second team, but is expected to break into the starting lineup before long.

The Grants Pass Cavemen, also starting the season under

a new coach, Justin Weakley, will travel to North Bend for a Saturday afternoon contest. Last season the Cavemen, with one of their finest elvens in history (only defeat was at the hands of Medford, 20 to 6), blanked North Bend by an 18 to 0 count, but may find the going tougher this year.

Almost to a man the 1940 Grants Pass starting eleven was graduated, and Weakley has nothing but a green squad to work with. However, he claims his lads have "loads of fight, and that's going to help a lot."

Klamath Falls apparently has the toughest week-end game, clashing with Portland's Grant high at Klamath Falls Friday night. Grant was last year's metropolitan champ, and while not believed to be so strong as in 1940 the Pelicans will undoubtedly have their bills full with the big city club.

All Southern Oregon conference teams will play on turf for the first time in history this season. Following in the footsteps of Medford and Klamath Falls, who pioneered the grass gridirons, Ashland and Grants Pass put in grass last spring and their velvety fields are ready for the pounding of cleats

Corvallis, Ore., Sept. 18.—(P)—Oregon State's Coach Lon Stiner shed a tear for newspapermen today. The boys in the press box who must keep track of substitutions have his sympathy, he assured them, at the same time announcing that he expected to pour men on the field as freely as the size of his squad would permit.

Most traveling squads will be larger this year, he said, since the unlimited substitution rule makes it feasible to carry specialists who will be able to call the play they are sent in to execute.

He was the fourth back to drop from the squad and Coach Tex Oliver has started training his remaining players to handle double assignments.

MILD WINTER ONE REASON FOR MORE GAME THAN USUAL

Bag Limit One Blacktail Or One Mule Deer—Does Available In Klamath Co.

As hunters oiled their rifles and checked over camping equipment for the opening of the 1941 deer season Saturday, reports from the state police and the Rogue River National Forest headquarters indicated that the game would be more plentiful than last year, and possibly more so than in many previous years. The season will close October 25, inclusive, the same as in 1940.

Rogue River National Forest headquarters cited three reasons why there will probably be more deer roaming the mountains in southern Oregon this season than last. Namely, because of the mild winter in 1940-41, thus allowing more deer to survive; the large number of deer seen by forest visitors and Rogue River National Forest employees during the summer, and because of the fact that more persons have been employed during the past year, which would presumably cause a decrease in the number of deer killed out of season for food.

The bag limit this year will be the same as last, one blacktail or one mule deer having not less than forked horns. Both deer coupons from the general hunting license must be attached to deer of either species when killed, according to the Oregon state game commission.

A special gun regulation this year makes it unlawful to use shotguns loaded with buckshot or bird shot to hunt or kill any big game.

A limited deer season will be held this year in the Fremont area in Klamath and Lake counties, and in portions of Grant, Cook and Wheeler counties. The commission reports that 3,800 tags for does have been sold, and emphasized that all hunters possessing doe tags must register at checking stations before entering the hunting area, and must again register upon leaving the area, regardless of whether a kill was made.

Antelope hunting will be permitted in two areas. In the first, the season will open Sept. 22 and close Oct. 3 in that part of Malheur county south of the Burns-Ontario highway. The other will open in portions of Lake and Harney counties Sept. 28 and will continue through Oct. 5. The 3,000 special antelope tags authorized is nearly exhausted, the game commission reported.

NIXON IS APPOINTED MINES COORDINATOR

Salem, Sept. 18.—(P)—Appointment of Earl K. Nixon, state director of geology and mineral industries, as emergency coordinator of mines for Oregon was announced today by Governor Charles A. Sprague, who made the appointment at the request of the federal office of production management.

Nixon will help mine operators in obtaining emergency repair equipment so that they may continue production.

RALLY IN NINTH ENABLES BROOKS TO RETAIN LEAD

The favorite flippancy of baseball players is "I'd rather be lucky than good" and this little crumb of wisdom explains why the Brooklyn Dodgers still are in first place in the National league and seem destined to win the pennant.

They are fate's fair-haired boys even though their lead has shrunk like a dollar shirt in the last couple of days. Their daily adventures read like chapters out of a story book and yesterday they outdid that fictional piker, Merriwell, again. Brooklyn was on the verge of dropping its second straight game, trailing 3-1 going into the ninth inning at Pittsburgh. A loss coupled with a double victory by St. Louis over the Boston Braves would have transferred first place to the Cardinals by a tiny percentage margin.

But what happened? You guessed it, the Dodgers scored five runs in the ninth inning and beat the Pirates 6-4 to retain a one-game margin over the Cards, who whipped the Braves 6-1 and 3-2.

The Cincinnati Reds bagged a doubleheader from the Phils 1-0 and 3-2. The Chicago Cubs climbed on the New York Giants 7-3. In the American league the New York Yankees clipped the Chicago White Sox 5-3. The Boston Red Sox edged out Cleveland 3-2. Detroit downed the Philadelphia Athletics 3-2, and Washington whipped the St. Louis Browns 9-8 in 10 innings.

TERRY CLINCHES COAST HILL TOGA

Los Angeles, Sept. 18.—(P)—The 1941 pitching crown of the Pacific Coast league belongs to Yank Terry, San Diego right-hander.

Terry, 28-year-old newcomer to the loop, had 25 wins against eight losses through Tuesday. That gave him an average of .758. Hal Turpin of Seattle, with a record of 18-6 and an average of .750, might beat him out in the percentage department but he can't approach that 25-win record.

Dick Barrett of Seattle, currently boasting a 19-12 record, won the coast hurling crown last year. An early season injury hampered his chances of repeating.

Rainers Virtually Rivet Third Pennant By Blanking Angels

Seattle had its third straight Coast league championship virtually within grasp today, after hustling into first place late in the season with an astonishing rally.

With six games yet to play, the Rainiers hold a three-game lead over second-place Sacramento. By winning three more games, they can clinch the pennant even if Sacramento should capture all five contests remaining on its schedule. Seattle took over the lead two weeks ago, overhauling a 16-game advantage the Solons held at mid-season. The Rainiers increased their margin a full game last night by defeating Los Angeles, while Oakland thumped Sacramento and reduced the Solons' pennant chances to the mathematical category.

The Rainiers edged Los Angeles 1 to 0 in the opening game of a double-header, and played to a scoreless tie in the night-cap, which ended in the eighth inning because of the Coast league curfew.

Oakland blasted a tie in the ninth inning and nipped Sacramento, 6 to 5. Mel Duezabou singled, stole second, and scored the winning run on Bill Rigney's single to center.

Hollywood set San Diego down for the third consecutive time, 5 to 1.

Portland defeated six runs on errors, and collected San Francisco 6 to 4. The Beavers got three runs in the sixth when Don White dropped Herman Reich's fly, and Froilan Fernandez bobbled two grounders in the eighth, setting up three more runs.

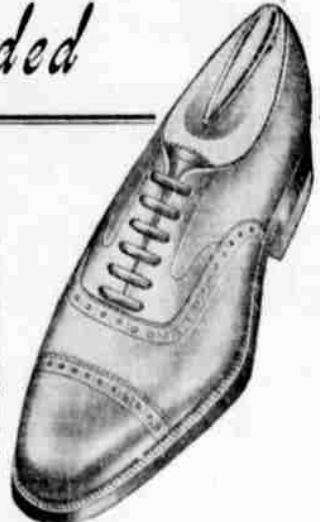
