JACKSON COUNTY PUBLIC WELFARE CONTINUES CLIMB

Public welfare costs in Jackson county rose to \$22,747.89 in August as compared with \$22,728.09 in July and \$19,793.42 in August last year, it was shown in statistical reports analyzed at the regular monthly meeting of the Jackson county public welfare commission in city hall Friday.

There was a decrease in the cost of general assistance (direct aid) but expenditures for old age assistance continued upward while other categories showed little change one way or the other. Eight hundred fourteen old age assistance cases cost \$16,173 in August as compared with \$16,127 for 813 cases in July and \$12,918.85 for 660 cases in August a year ago. On September 1 there were 90 applications for old age assistance pending for investigation. Blanche D. Lyman, administrator, informed the commission.

In August \$3,618.89 was spent on 98 families and 60 singles receiving general assistance as compared with \$3,643.09 on 110 families and 65 singles in July and \$4,043.57 on 129 families and 101 singles in August last year. Mrs. Lyman said there were no employables receiving general assistance last month. She explained that the government's food stamp plan was a factor in relatively higher per capita general assistance expenditures. Saying that the general assistance budget now provided more adequate relief than heretofore, Mrs. Lyman stated that expenditures would have to go up before they could go down, explaining that the rising cost of living was becoming a large factor.

But for accidental cases, the

non-resident welfare problem now is practically nil, Mrs. Lyman said. She stated that the farm security administration migrant labor camp here has been "a great relief to the community," adding that she had not this year received a single complaint about migrants polluting creeks or trespassing in barns. A. S. V. Carpenter, commission chairman who presided, said that poor men were "happy" over the camp.
