And I happened to receive one of the dresses that you had made and I found your address in the pocket. I want to say how grateful I am, and how much I appreciate the work and kindnesses you are doing for all of us unfortunate people over here.

"We are hoping this war will soon come to an end. I am also hoping that I will be able to do some kindness for you some day. So wishing you all the best of luck, I am, yours truly, M. Tiley."
