

T-Formation Black Tornado Meets Weed in Grid Opener Tonight

NINE LETTERMEN TO START CLASH; TEAM WEIGHS 171

Bowman Says Eleven Will Attack From T-Formation And Notre Dame Shift.

Medford high's 1941 edition of the Black Tornado, drilled to a "T" in the T-formation and with nine lettermen of last season in its starting lineup, will be unveiled at the stadium tonight in opposition to the Weed, Cal., high school Cougars. The opening kickoff is slated for 8 o'clock sharp.

The Medford eleven, averaging 171 pounds per player, with the line tipping the scales at 175 pounds and the backfield at 165 per unit, will take the field with exactly 16 days of stiff practice sessions behind it, nine of which were spent at Lake o' Woods.

Coach Bill Bowman said the Tigers would employ plenty of the T-formation along with the tried-and-true Notre Dame shift.

The starting lineup, Bowman said, would include Bill Wall, 192, and Curt Hopkins, 165, at ends; Bud Mayfield, 195 and Ray Casebeer, 174, at tackles; Roger Barker, 165 and Bob Mitchell, 170, at guards; Dan Winter, 165, at center; Bob Stead, 160, at quarterback; Cato Wray, 140, at left halfback; Ike Orr, 165, at right halfback and Jimmy Glenn, 195, at fullback.

Three Shifts
Wall, who has been shifted from tackle to end, will be the lone returning line regular from last season. However, the other forwards are lettermen with the exception of Mayfield, a transfer from Woodland, Cal., and Casebeer, up from junior high. Hopkins, the other end, was a regular back last season. Another shift has seen Glenn move out of the line to the fullback position.

While little is known regarding the strength of the Cougars, they will come here with their three-year lettermen in their lineup—Argyris, lightning-fast right halfback; Aquila, fullback and Kegg, left end.

Jean Eberhart will referee, Ed Ellertsen will umpire and George Robertson will act as head linesman.

Sacramento stayed in the race by edging Oakland, 2 to 0. After losing four games in a row, San Diego unwrapped two fine pitching performances to beat Hollywood in both ends of a doubleheader, 3-2 and 4-0.

ICE ANTICS

(This is another in the series of Friday articles by Sparky Bourque, manager and professional instructor at the Medford Ice Arena now under construction, dealing with all phases of plain and fancy ice skating.)

Ice skating is a sport that has much to offer in the way of physical and mental benefits. It can be said that it gives mental and physical relaxation and pleasure, that it tends to build up all groups of muscles and improves the relationship between mental and muscular coordination, that it benefits posture and encourages deep full breathing, that it improves balance and hence carriage and poise, that it can be partaken of and enjoyed alone or with one's fellows in a spirit of fun or in competition, that it involves no great financial outlay and need be no thief of time, that it may be enjoyed almost from the cradle to the grave. That is ice skating.

According to Dr. Nelse F. Ockenblad "The moist, cool, dust-free air of the ice arena is beneficial if not downright curative to sinus victims." Skating is a sport that can be carried over into and past middle age with beneficial results. It takes the fat off the middle and keeps it off, and generally keeps one toned up. It seems everyone is on thin ice these days. Why not skate on it?

In the previous two articles

we discussed forward and backward skating and how to stop. When the skater has mastered these primary movements he is then ready to take up figure skating. One writer gave this definition of figure skating, "artist plus athlete equals figure skater." The figure skaters' practice is made up of many school figures starting with the figure eight. Every turn and movement the skater uses is taken up in the school figures.

To show the importance of having them perfected, Olympic champions train for six and eight hours each day, tracing and retracing their school figures. When the skater has mastered the figure eight on all edges he is ready to learn dancing on ice. Ice dancing requires very little more energy than ballroom dancing. The standard ice dances are, the waltz, fox-trot, the tango, and the fourteen-step, besides countless variations. One need not be an expert to enjoy dancing on ice. It is a thrill to say the least.

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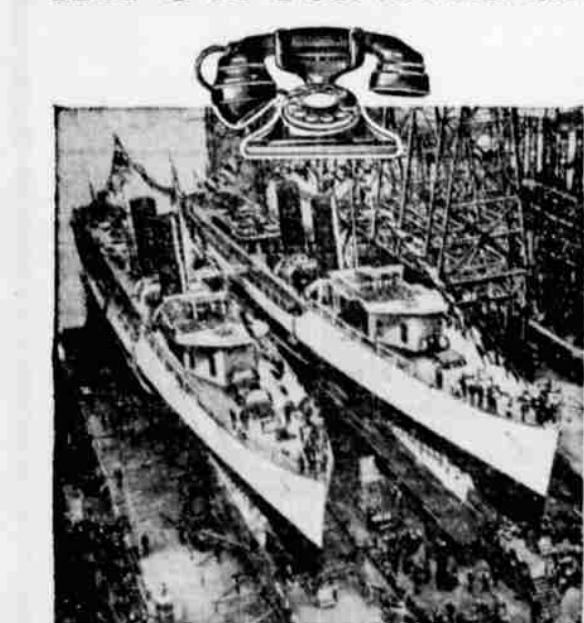
