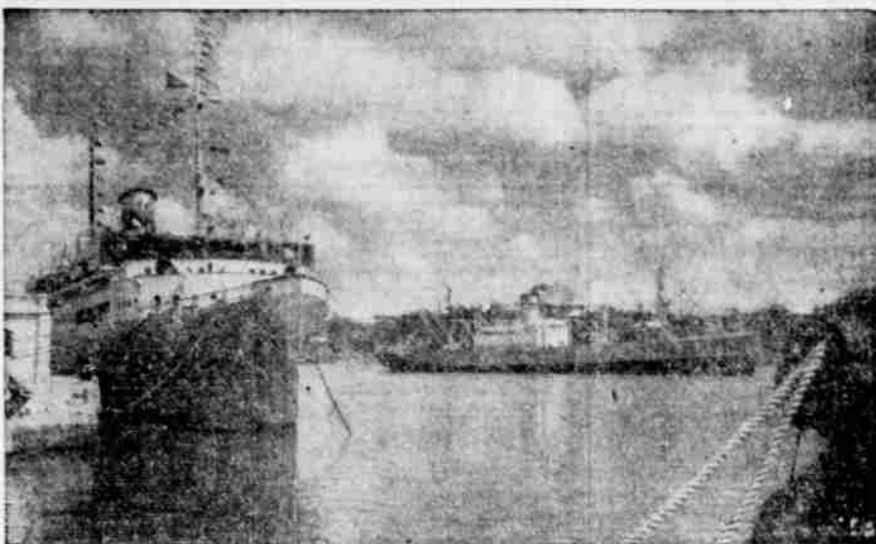

FLEEING BANDITS KILLED IN CRASH

Ellwood City, Pa., Sept. 20.—(P)—Ignoring the barking guns of three bandits fleeing after a \$3,500 bank robbery, police officers and a drug store clerk shot one of them to death while another was injured fatally in a crash of the "getaway car" after

a spectacular chase through this western Pennsylvania town. The slain bandit's two companions also were wounded but attached at an Ellwood City hospital said that crash injuries and not gunshot wounds caused the second suspect's death today.

The pursuit was touched off yesterday by the third holdup at the First National bank of Harrisville, 30 miles northeast of here.

LIFT FIRE RULES TO AID HUNTERS

Rogue River national forest headquarters yesterday announced lifting of the seasonal regulations requiring forest users to procure permits for campfires, requesting campers to be equipped with an ax and a bucket and prohibiting smoking in vehicles proceeding through forest areas.

It was emphasized, however, that it is unlawful at all times to leave a burning campfire unattended.

There is still danger of fire in the forest and the restrictions have been lifted primarily as a convenience to hunters, headquarters said. Little rain has fallen on the forest in the past few days, none at all in the Applegate district, and because of this hunters were asked to cooperate and do everything possible to prevent fires.

New York, Sept. 20.—(P)—Warren Wright's three-year-old champion, Whirlaway, won the 49th running of the Lawrence Realization at Belmont park by 10 lengths today.

Hal Price Headley's Alaking was second, six length in front of W. E. Boeing's Time Counts. William Dupont, Jr.'s Fairymant

was a poor last in a field of four.

Whirlaway ran the mile and five-eighths in the low time of 2:44 1-5, largely because after the first five-eighths of a mile he had no competition.

The victory was worth \$22,800 to the long-tailed colt, boosting the earnings for his two-year racing career to \$347,411 and pushing him into third place on the all-time list of money winners. Only Seabiscuit and Sunbeau are still in front of him.

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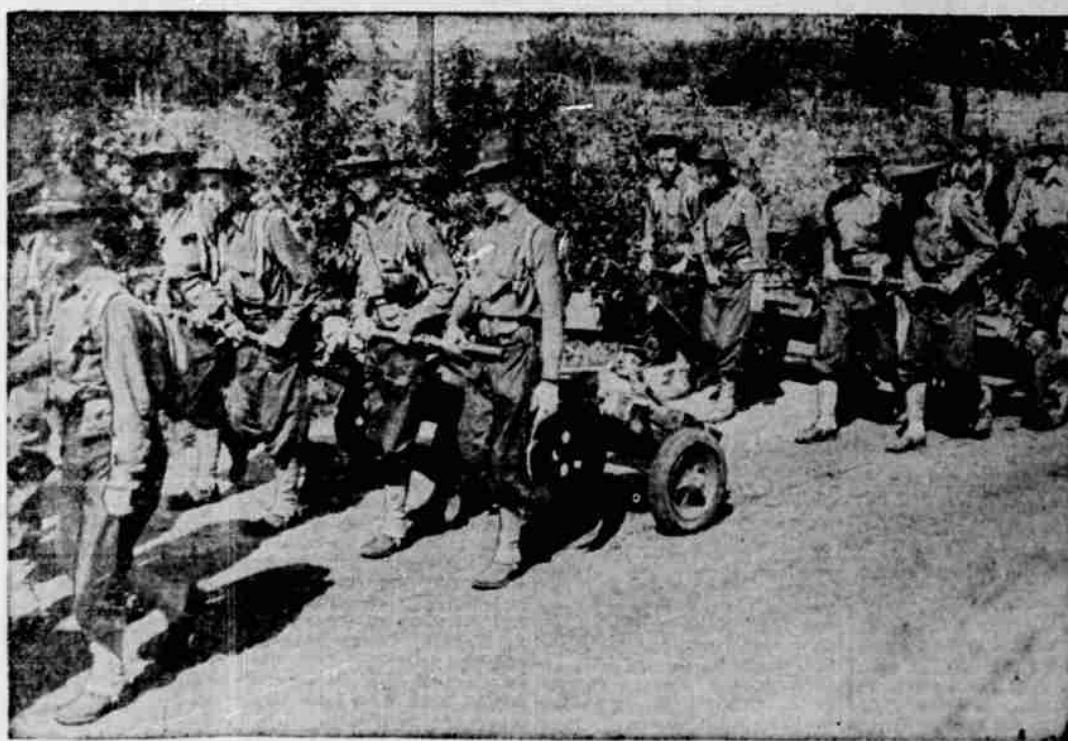
