## REDDING MOTHER BEATEN TO DEATH WITH AUTO AXLE

Husband Arrested Admits Jealousy — Domestic Aroused By Child, Finds Tragedy.

Redding, Calif., Sept. 22.—(P)—Mrs. Laura Baxter, 25-year-old mother of five was beaten to death with a weapon fashioned from an automobile axle, and District Attorney Lawrence W. Carr said today her widow, William C. Baxter, declared he "must have done it."

The attack, which Carr said Baxter attributed to jealousy, occurred yesterday morning in a bedroom of the family home. Police got their first report of it from Ruth Green, a domestic employed by the Baxters, who was sleeping in an adjoining room.

**Awakened by Child**  
Miss Green told the district attorney she was awakened by Louis Guilmetti, 9, Mrs. Baxter's son by a former marriage. The boy came running to her, she said, and cried:

"Daddy's killing mother."

Miss Green hurried to the Baxter's bedroom, and there found Mrs. Baxter lying on the floor and her husband standing beside her.

"Well, I've done it, so you can go and call the cops," the woman quoted Baxter as saying. Baxter a lineman on a U. S. bureau of reclamation survey crew, was arrested on an open charge later at his home, where Detective Sergeant Scott Lincecum said he found an 18-inch length of axle, weighing eight pounds and covered with bur-lap.

## SI ELLIOTT WINS TOP PRIZE MONEY IN ANNUAL RODEO

Susanville Cowpoke Cheered By 2,000 Sunday—This Year's Show One of Best.

Hard-riding Si Elliott of Susanville, Cal., with one first, two seconds and four thirds, grabbed the lion's share of prize money in the two-day second annual Medford rodeo which ended Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds park. Some 2,000 spectators, twice the number who saw Saturday's show, were on hand to cheer the performers.

Elliott took second in the Brahma bull riding and thirds in the bulldogging, calf roping and steer stopping yesterday to add to his Saturday victory in the bulldogging, his second in the Brahma bull riding and his third in the bronco riding.

**"Shorty" Lee Wins**  
"Shorty" Lee, for the second straight day, captured the Brahma bull riding contest. Along with six other cowboys he rode a bull, "Droopy, Jr." for eight seconds, and received first prize on the basis of superior riding ability.

Jack Sherman of Calgary, Canada, on "Battleground," took first place in Sunday's bronco riding. Bill McFarlane of Bakerville, Cal., topped top honors in calf roping in the excellent time of 16.2; Chuck Shephard, with a time of 14.3, took first in the bulldogging, and tied with Len Perkins of Yuma, Ariz., for first place in the steer stopping, both having times of 4.3.

Colorful drills by the Yreka, Cal., sheriff's posse and the women's posse featured the grand entrance at the start of the show. Also appearing in the grand parade were the Jackson county sheriff's posse, queen of the rodeo, Nina Tuttle and her two princesses, Susan Vilas and Dorothy Hayes, and scores of local horsemen and horsewomen. The prize to the best dressed cowboy was awarded to Frank Lowe of the Klamath county sheriff's posse.

**Show One of Best**  
The rodeo, staged by Max Barbour of Klamath Falls for the Medford Athletic association, was said to be one of the best ever seen in the valley, and will be held again next year.

## 16 CHURCHES RISE AT SAME TIME FOR FORT LEWIS MEN

Fort Lewis—(P)—Religion is coming this winter to the 50,000 troops of the 9th army corps.

Sixteen church spires are rising with an almost supernatural aspect above the barracks roofs in the 41st division cantonment and the Fort Lewis area.

As if by magic, a recent command from congress and an appropriation of \$268,876, caused the 16 structures to begin rising from their foundations—all in approximately the same degree of daily development.

Built with steep slanting roofs and high peaks and spires, the identical chapels lend a rural air to the barren newness of the cantonments.

They are designed to serve all faiths. Each chapel will have a movable altar so constructed as to be adaptable for use by several religious groups. A series of doors and panels in the altars will provide essential requirements for each kind of service.

Both pulpit and lectern are designed to serve particular needs, and, like the altar, both are movable. The main floor will seat 300 persons. A flight of stairs leads to a balcony where the electric organ is installed. The balcony seats 57.

## Detail Perfection to Be 41st Division Aim For Next 3 Months

Fort Lewis—(P)—Perfection of details in basic training of individuals and small units will be the keynote of training for the 41st division during the next three months, Maj.-Gen. George A. White announces.

An important part of the program will be the anti-mechanized training schedule. Included in this instruction will be the exhibiting of mechanized defense training films and demonstrations in tank and anti-tank tactics. A division school in anti-tank defense will be conducted.

All officers and non-commissioned officers will attend school four afternoons a week. These schools will be conducted by regimental and separate unit commanders.

The training program for the next three months also specifies that morning calisthenics will be accomplished with music by regimental bands.

In line with the program, Wednesday afternoon from 1 to 4:30 will be devoted to mass athletics.
