CARDINAL ERRORS LOST FIRST GAME IN PIRATE SERIES

Revenge Obtained In Nightcap After Damage Done—Dodgers Near Pay-off.

The Brooklyn Dodgers are almost at the place where they can pull the trigger on the St. Louis Cardinals and you can practically hear them panting at the prospect.

All along the Dodgers have been insisting that the Cards could not sweep through the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Chicago Cubs and Brooklyn had it figured exactly. The Cardinals came a cropper at Pittsburgh yesterday, 4-0, in the first game of a doubleheader and even though they won the second game 9-0, the damage was done.

Cards Whip Selves

The Cards whipped themselves yesterday. They made five errors, two by Shortstop Martin Marion, and Mort Cooper, their most reliable right-hander, got knocked out of the box in the first inning.

Marion made one of his errors on the first Pittsburgh player to come to bat, then Elbie Fletcher doubled and both scored on a other single by Deb Garna single by Vince DiMaggio. Answered DiMaggio and chased Cooper to the showers.

In the nightcap the Cards came back with the fierceness of avengers. Max Lanier, a southpaw, pitched fine eight-hit ball, the Pirates made four errors, and the Cards made two home runs—one by Stan Musial

with one on and the other by Estel Crabtree with two aboard. The Chicago Cubs clipped the Cincinnati Reds 5-1. The New York Giants and Phillies divided a doubleheader, the Phils parading to victory 8-2, and New York turning the tables to win the nightcap 8-6.

The Philadelphia Athletics spoiled Red Ruffing's world series tuneup by batting him out of the box in the ninth inning and winning 9-8.

Washington scored twice in the ninth to beat the Boston Red Sox 4-3 and Detroit rallied for three in the tenth to stop the St. Louis Browns 4-1, lifting the Tigers into a tie for third place.

OREGON GIVES UP HOPE FOR HARRIS

Eugene, Sept. 24.—(P)—The University of Oregon today definitely lost the hoped-for end strength of Hymie Harris, regular right wingman in 1939 who was slated to return this season. Coach Tex Oliver has received word from the Seattle veteran that his requested inactive application has been refused by the United States naval reserves and that he will remain on duty in Chicago.

Oliver, however, is satisfied with the performance of two 200-pounders who have been working at the position, namely Jim Sheppard, 1940 reserve end and former frosh fullback, and Bill Borchert, 6-foot-4 center on Oregon's basketball team for the past two seasons.

The Webfoots will continue secret practice through Thursday, leaving that night for Palo Alto and Saturday's important opener against Stanford's conference champions.

Aschom, Moshofsky Webfoot Tackles

Eugene, Ore., Sept. 24.—(P)—A young heavyweight who never played high school football and an understudy for Jim Stuart, the University of Oregon's stellar linesman last year, took over the tackle position on the Webfoot campus today.

Dick Aschom, 219-pounder in his third year at football is expected to play right tackle. Ed Moshofsky, another junior, weighing 216, will be at left tackle.

HARD WORKOUTS SHARPEN TIGERS FOR FRIDAY TILT

Bowerman Boys Drill On Down-Field Blocking—Results Dissatisfy Coach.

Coach Bill Bowerman is running his Medford high school Tigers through tough workouts this week in preparation for the first big football game of the year—Corvallis at the local stadium at 8:15 Friday night. But work as his men will, Bowerman is not satisfied yet.

"We've been drilling hard on down-field blocking but we're not functioning right yet," Bowerman said ruefully as he described how ragged this department of the game was last week against the comparatively weak team from Weed, Cal. "We're trying to iron out other defensive trouble, too, in anticipation of a strong Corvallis attack and I can't say I'm any too well pleased yet. Corvallis, you know, is reputed to have the biggest and fastest team in years and it looks like a big order for us Friday night."

Corvallis Line Big

The Corvallis line, Bowerman said, is bigger than the Medford line, and the Tigers are no peewees. Biggest and best in the Corvallis line, he rated Chuck Apple, 230 pounds of dynamite.

Meantime some injuries are bothering the Tiger outfit. Curt Hopkins left end, who had his face pretty well cut up last Friday, is going around with a swollen phiz but a special mask has been made for him so that he can start Friday night. Left half Cato Wray has a bruised left shoulder and right half Ike Orr, who already had suffered from one Charley horse, now has another. Other players are plagued with minor but annoying injuries.

The game has been set down 15 minutes to 8:15 to allow time for a huge bonfire just north of the stands. A big crowd is anticipated, though a few reserved seats were still available today.

Louis Gaining Interest In Next Week's Go With Nova

Greenwood Lake, N. Y., Sept. 24.—(P)—Joe Louis, who has been accused of lacking interest in training for his numerous title defenses in the past year or so, seems to be getting stirred up about next week's scrap with Lou Nova.

Joe not only belabored four sparring partners with vicious intent in yesterday's drill but he didn't even want to stop when his headgear slipped off in a brisk exchange with George Nicholson. He tossed the protective armor aside and started to wade in again, but Promoter Mike Jacobs, thinking of what might happen to the expected \$700,000 gate if Louis should receive a cut, rushed to the ringside and saw to it that the workout was halted until the headgear was replaced.

Pompton Lakes, N. J., Sept. 24.—(P)—Lou Nova tossed a final right-hand shot at sparring partner Johnny Aichers as the going sounded, then leaped over the ropes and remarked, "This guy's a lot tougher than Louis."

Which just goes to show you how Louis the Yogi's fistic family, all the way from the chief in the kitchen, right up to and including the blond Californian, himself, feel about the heavy-weight champion who has been rated by many the greatest fighter of all time.

There is nothing but contempt for the Joe Louis punching power, his durability and even his heart in this Lakeside camp of the hero of the cosmic punch who has a date with the bomber Monday night in the Polo Grounds ring in New York. Up here, the No. 1 boy is just another guy named Joe.
