

JUDGING FINISHED ON SHOWMANSHIP 4-H STOCK SHOW

Loree Brennesholtz, Louis Walsh Are Rated Best In Dairy and Beef Divisions.

Completing the final divisions in showmanship at the fourth annual Jackson county 4-H livestock show opening at the fairgrounds here yesterday morning, Loree Brennesholtz of Table Rock forged to the front with her well behaved Jersey calf as champion showman of the dairy breeds. Louis (Buck) Walsh of Lake Creek topped the beef showmanship contest as champion with his well mannered Hereford calf.

The showmanship feature of the varied phases of stock raising is an art of its own, considering that the judge is looking simultaneously at the poise and tidiness of the young exhibitors, as well as at the cleanliness and behavior of the animals. The Chesterwhite hogs particularly shone in their pink and white glory yesterday, and apparently had submitted to chlorox, soap, "elbow grease," and talcum powder, all of which were suggested by Cliff Jenkins, Klamath county 4-H leader, who acted as judge. A few of the porkers insisted on a little scrapping, however, and the Duroc-Jersey capturing the showmanship contest for Norman Smith of Table Rock, all but had his own way about being photographed by Phil Brainerd.

All exhibitors rating up to sixth place in the numerous features of the show are given paper premiums to be placed in the stalls. Silk ribbons will be presented the boys and girls with their premium checks, it was explained by L. E. Only Members Can Qualify For Payments Under Agreement With U.S.D.A.

The Oregon-Washington-California Pear league is now accepting applications for membership at its headquarters, 419 Liberty building, Medford. Applications should be addressed to the manager, Ralph G. Bardwell.

A league advertisement in today's Mail Tribune points out

that only members of the league can qualify for benefit payments under the diversion agreement with the U. S. department of agriculture by which the government, in the 1941-42 season, will pay 30 cents a box on shipments of winter varieties of pears to diversion markets. The agreement applies to growers and shippers of Anjou, Bosc, Winter Nellis, Comice and Hardy pears grown in Oregon, Washington and California. Details of the program are procurable from the league.

Diversion markets for the 1941-42 season are: North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, Louisiana, Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina and South Carolina.
