

OREGON TO SHARE AMERICA'S DRIVE FOR 'WAR FOODS'

More Eggs, Milk, Beef, Veal And More Farm Gardens State's Part In Effort.

Corvallis, Sept. 25.—(Sp.)—More eggs, more milk, more beef and veal, and more farm gardens will be Oregon's principal part in agriculture's all-out mobilization for defense in 1942, according to Robert B. Taylor of Pendleton, chairman of the Oregon U.S.D.A. agricultural defense board.

Oregon's production goals, brought back from an 11 state conference of farmers and farm leaders at Salt Lake City last week, have been reviewed and accepted by the state defense board, Taylor said. Within the next two weeks, a statewide drive will be launched to marshal the state's productive strength behind the program.

Biggest Job
"Oregon agriculture has been given its biggest job, and we must deliver," Taylor declared. "With the assurance of Secretary Wickard that achieving these production goals is just as important to the nation as building tanks and planes, I am confident that our Oregon farmers will get the job done."

Program leaders will now break down the state goals into county figures after which a farm-to-farm drive will be made to get the increases promised on a voluntary basis.

An 11 percent increase in milk production is asked from this state in 1942, or an increase from 1,143,000,000 pounds to 1,269,000,000 pounds. Most of this increase must come from increasing production of present dairy herds. Other important state goals and the percentages of increase over this year's production are as follows:

Eggs, 32,853,000 dozen, up 12 percent; beef cattle and calves, marketing and farm slaughter, 280,088,000 pounds, 22 percent increase; hogs, marketing and farm slaughter, 66,538,000 pounds, a decrease of five percent; sheep and lambs, 91,250,000 pounds, down one percent; corn, 65,000 acres, up 7 percent; oats, 330,000 acres, same as 1941; barley, 170,000 acres, a 15 percent decrease.

All hay, 1,007,000 acres, same as 1941; wheat 756,000 acres (official allotment), a 10 percent decrease; rye, 42,000 acres, down 20 percent; flax for seed, 5000 acres, up 15 percent; green peas for processing, 35,000 acres, up 11 percent; snap beans for processing, 3300 acres, up 6 percent; farm gardens, an increase from 43,034 to 59,500; commercial vegetables for fresh use, 40,700 acres, up 2 1/2 percent. Oats, hay, and Irish potatoes are the same as in 1940.

CONGRESS IS PUT IN DOLDRUMS BY RULE ON JOURNAL

House Chafes Under Ban Of 'Applause,' 'Laughter' In Congressional Record.

Washington.—The house of representatives is in the doldrums. It has been shorn of its laughter, applause and cheers—at least so far as the Congressional Record is concerned. And there are some who ever would welcome return of the "Bronx cheer" if they could only get the notations back into the Record that their stirring speeches didn't find the customers sitting on their hands and that their wisecracks weren't just jocular duds.

It started back in June when Rep. Clare Hoffman of Michigan asked permission to correct the Congressional Record. On a certain page, he said, following a speech that he had made the Record noted that there was "Applause."

"There was no applause," said Congressman Hoffman, "and I ask that the word be stricken out."

Flabbergasting
This somewhat flabbergasting request made such an impression that Speaker Sam Rayburn made a rule. He pointed out that it was the chair's opinion that "applause," "laughter," etc., were not a part of the house proceedings and should not be incorporated into the Record and thereafter would not be.

At the moment no one took the matter very seriously. But reading the Record, from day to day, brought a different reaction. A member got off a smart one. The house and the galleries laughed. The next day reading the Record, he checked up to see just how funny he was and at the end of his hilarious gag was just a cold little period and after that a quick resumption of business.

Get Full Credit
It was the same when the members delivered themselves of those titillating orations that called for hand-claps and hand-claps. So far as the Record showed the members might have been reading from the 3,000th page of the cumulative statistics on the life cycle of a house fly.

Into this deplorable state of affairs the other day (all the more deplorable since the senate report in the Record, with such phrases as "boisterous laughter" and "loud applause," still shows to what extent the senators are laying them in the aisles) stepped Rep. Louis Ludlow of Indiana, who as newspaperman and congressman has been watching the Washington scene for 40 years.

In all his career there had been only one such other demonstration of honesty as Mr. Hoffman's, said Mr. Ludlow. That was 35 years ago when John Shafroth, a representative from Colorado, stood on the floor and presented his resignation, stating that he had been studying the evidence surrounding his election, and that he had come to the conclusion that the other fellow had been elected.

Nevertheless, said Mr. Ludlow, the ruling attendant upon this later demonstration of honesty had caused a lot of members of congress, including himself, "bitter anguish."
