

## PARIS BECOMES NAZI CITY; OLD APPEAL IS GONE

German Touch Seen Every-  
where As Former French  
Capital Loses Landmarks

Paris (U.P.)—What was unbe-  
lievable of Paris in the spring  
of 1940 is commonplace now.  
There is an abundance of Ger-  
man soldiers. There is no cafe  
au lait. In fact, the coffee it-  
self is only 25 per cent real.

The streets, buildings and  
street cleaners are just about the  
same as they were a year ago,  
but the city has changed never-  
theless. The following account is  
what the United Press correspon-  
dent saw in an hour's stroll  
in the vicinity of the Opera.

A large sign on a Boulevard  
des Italiens building housing the  
United Press offices, reads:  
"Learn German in Sixty Les-  
sons." Last year the emphasis  
was on English.

Below is a men's clothing  
store and a shoe shop. On the  
window of the latter a notice in-  
forms the restriction-laden pub-  
lic:

"The shoe store syndicate has  
the honor to inform the public  
that it will find herein forms  
with which you can request a  
permit to buy shoes. The per-  
sonnel is at your disposal to  
answer questions on this sub-  
ject."

**Shoes In Odd Sizes**  
Set off by a portrait of Mar-  
shal Henri Philippe Petain, the  
window is attractive. Paper  
strips to guard against splinter-  
ing glass have been removed.  
Most of the shoes, however, are  
in small or medium sizes.

A newsstand on the corner  
features German newspapers,  
magazines, guides to Paris writ-  
ten in German and pamphlets on  
French wines. Gone are the  
London journals and the Paris  
edition of the New York Herald-  
Tribune. On the billboard space  
on the white, uncompleted Ford  
building is the latest anti-British  
propaganda poster. Next door a  
movie house advertises: "Bel-  
Ami," one of the latest films  
from Vienna.

On the canopy of the Restau-  
rant Capucines is a banner in red  
and black German letters: "Pous-  
set Spatenbrau Munich."

**Signs In German**  
Just before the boulevard runs  
into the Place de l'Opera, a  
theater is closed by an iron gate.  
It has not been reopened since  
there was a commotion during a  
newsreel showing some months  
ago.

## Smarter 1942 Chevrolets Here Friday



New massiveness, contribut-  
ing to the smartest styling ever  
designed for the nation's No. 1

As in past years, the new car  
is presented in the Master de  
lux and Special de luxe series.  
The Fleetline series, introduced  
mid-season last year in sedan  
only, is represented again by  
sedan, known as the Sportmas-  
ter, and the new Fleetline six-  
passenger Aerosedan, said to be  
one of the most attractively  
styled models in the entire  
showing.

The same attention to finish-  
ed detail that is apparent in the  
exterior of the new models is  
noted at once inside the car.  
Smart styling, fine materials,  
and excellent design have pro-  
duced the most beautiful and  
comfortable interiors that Chev-  
rolet ever has offered.

Though wheelbase on all  
models is unchanged from 1941,  
remaining at 116", stylists have  
set the over-all length at 157 3/4",  
creating a long, low, sleek car  
that combines sweeping lines  
with a generally rugged appear-  
ance. Complete new front-end  
treatment, handled harmonious-

### PASTOR DIES

Oregon City, Sept. 25.—(U.P.)—  
The Rev. Edward W. Whithell,  
48, pastor of Willamette Metho-

ly, does much to convey an im-  
pression of greater size and in-  
creased sturdiness throughout.  
A new, lower, wider, more  
massive grille with its heavier  
bars gives an instant impres-  
sion of bigness, while the  
blunter, deeper hood, front  
splash shield, and more widely  
spaced Sealed Beam headlights  
contribute to that effect. Greater  
length is indicated at once by  
the new elongated front fenders,  
which flow back into the front  
doors, swinging with the  
doors as they are opened. The  
new fender design permits desir-  
able clean, smooth surfaces.  
An ingenious touch is the new  
foot scraper at the front run-  
ning board step pad, created by  
a triangular extension of the  
new fenders.

Because the unusually suc-  
cessful Chevrolet engine devel-  
oped for 1941 is retained with  
only minor refinements for the  
new year, power output remains  
virtually the same, assuring the  
same high performance charac-  
teristics so generally acclaimed  
last year. Axle ratios and tire  
sizes likewise are unchanged,  
insuring hill-climbing ability,  
acceleration, and general over-  
all performance at the 1941  
level. Fuel and oil economy,  
long a Chevrolet trait, is also  
thus assured.

Much broader and deeper  
than before, the new hood ex-  
tends back to the front edge  
of the front door, displacing the  
former cowl side panel and  
making a cleaner line.

Greater sturdiness is apparent  
in the new bumpers and guards,  
for increased depth makes the  
bumpers appear more massive  
and increased crown depth as-  
sures greater resistance to im-  
pact. Guards are redesigned to  
ward a more massive appear-  
ance, and an added feature is  
the relocation of the front li-  
cense plate guard bar spanning  
the tops of the bumper guards  
and serving as a grille guard.

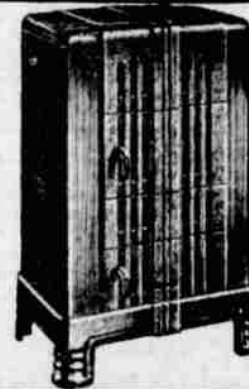

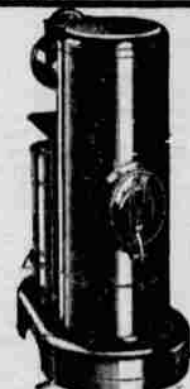
