U. S. NAT'L BANK REMODELING WILL INCREASE SPACE

Estimated \$10,000 Job To Facilitate Handling Of Increasing Business Volume

Twice the present lobby space will be provided by a complete remodeling of the interior of the Medford office, U. S. National Bank of Portland, George T. Frey, manager announced today. Remodeling work, to start within a few days, will be done one step at a time so as not to interfere with comfort and convenience of patrons, Mr. Frey said. The work will be in charge of Elmer Childers who handled the job three years ago when the entire bank building, at the northwest corner of Central avenue and Main street, was remodeled inside and out.

Business Grows
Interior remodeling now has been made necessary by increased business, Mr. Frey explained. Lobby space now is mostly in the front along Main street where it is not particularly needed.

The remodeled lobby will extend through the center of the bank, north and south, and not along the sides as now. The teller windows, now in the center, will be moved along the Central avenue wall, extending from the Central avenue entrance to the Main street wall. Four teller windows will be added to take care of any future expansion in business.

The three note windows, now extending east and west across the center of the office, will be swung around to extend north and south and parallel to the west wall of the bank. The bookkeeping department, now on the banking floor, will be moved to the mezzanine floor, which will be improved with a new lighting and air-conditioning system.

Take 60 Days
It is figured that the remodeling will take about 60 days, the time depending on delivery of certain materials, such as matched marble for the floor and walnut wainscoting for wall paneling.

The Oregon Granite company has assured the bank matching marble can be procured without difficulty but no report has been received on availability of the wainscoting, Mr. Frey said. He estimated cost of the remodeling at approximately \$10,000.

WOMAN INJURED IN AUTO SMASH; DRIVER IS FINED

Mrs. Dorothy Ritzloff, 22, of Grants Pass suffered multiple lacerations of the face, contusions of the forehead and eye and possible intra-cranial injuries early this morning when the car in which she was a passenger, operated by Leslie Chapman, 43, of Grants Pass, crashed into a parked car on South Riverside avenue, the second machine struck by the Chapman auto in 45 minutes.

Chapman, who suffered a cut on his chin and bruises, pleaded guilty to a city police charge of reckless driving and was fined \$25 by City Judge William A. Allen this morning. He paid the fine.

Mrs. Ritzloff, confined in Community hospital, was not critically injured, according to her attending physician. She was conscious and resting easily, he stated.

At 12:40 a. m. today city police received a report from Fred E. Lange, 404 South Grape street, that his Buick sedan, parked on 11th street, had been struck by a hit-run driver in a car turning the corner at 11th into Holly street.

Police immediately started looking for the hit-run car, and at 1:35 a. m. another call was received of an accident in front of the Roswood apartments on South Riverside avenue. Investigating, police discovered that the Chapman machine, a 1931 Chevrolet sedan traveling north, had crashed into a parked car registered to O. R. Tresham of Sams Valley. Police said the Chapman machine was the same one that struck the Lange auto on 11th street.

Sitting in the Tresham car at the time of the crash were Loral Edgington, Roger Tresham and Ray Smith, police stated. None were injured.

All three cars were damaged considerably, Chapman's machine being towed to a garage.

BRITE BROTHERS RENEW EFFORTS FOR LIBERATION

Former Jackson County Men Apply For Clemency In California Life Term.

Sacramento, Calif., Sept. 25.—(P)—John and Coke Brite, convicted of killing three men in the Siskiyou mountains five years ago, renewed legal efforts to get out of prison today.

They applied again to Gov. C. L. Olson for a commutation of their life term to time served and their attorney, Horace F. Frye of Sacramento, wrote the governor that "people interested in seeing these boys released have offered them places of employment."

M. Stanley Moak, Olson's executive secretary, informed Frye, however, that the advisory pardon board has several hundred pending cases ahead of theirs.

John, 41, and Coke, 36, were convicted in Siskiyou county of first degree murder for the shooting of Fred Seaborn and Deputy Sheriff Martin Lange and Joseph Clark who had gone to their mountain camp to serve a warrant on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

John and Coke Brite, former residents of this county were well known in Jacksonville and the Applegate district. Both had the reputation of being troublesome when drinking. Once after a Saturday rumper in Jacksonville, they were given a suspended sentence upon condition they leave this county. They later went to Siskiyou county, and the following summer were involved in the slaying that sent them to Folsom.
