JOE MARTIN AND HENRY FLETCHER HERE TOMORROW

Republican Leaders to Leave
Plane Here at Noon For
Trip To Roseburg Meet.

Joseph W. Martin, Jr., congressman from Massachusetts, minority leader in the house and chairman of the Republican national committee, and Henry P. Fletcher, former national chairman and now the committee's general counsel, are expected to arrive at Medford municipal airport from Reno via Sacramento by United Mainliner at 12:18 p. m. tomorrow. They will be on their way to Roseburg where at 8 p. m. Martin will give a broadcast address before the annual convention of the Oregon Republican club and affiliated organizations. They will be met at the airport here by Ralph C. Porter, Oregon national committeeman, Ralph Billings, Ashland, Jackson county representative on the state committee, and other local Republicans who will take the visitors by motorcar to Roseburg.

Start At Once
The group will start for Roseburg immediately after arrival of the plane as Martin is scheduled to begin a series of conferences with party organization representatives at the convention as soon after 3:30 as possible. Niel R. Allen, Grants Pass, state chairman, informed the Mail Tribune by long distance telephone. Mr. Allen was to leave for the Roseburg convention this morning.

Martin and Fletcher will return to Grants Pass Sunday morning for a day of steelhead fishing. Martin, Fletcher and C. E. C. are booked to leave here by Mainliner for Portland at 9:23 p. m. Sunday. The national chairman is on a tour of the west, meeting with party leaders to map out the 1942 campaign. His Roseburg program includes conferences with dele-

OBSTRUCTIONISM OF CONGRESSMEN DRAWS CRITICISM

Portland, Sept. 26.—(AP)—The setting for a hot fight in the Oregon state Republican convention at Roseburg today was readied with attacks on the voting record of three of the state's four G. O. P. congressmen.

Assailing the records of Reps. James W. Mott and Homer Angell, and Sen. Rufus Holman for opposition to the lend-lease bill, neutrality act revision and extension of draftees' term of service, a group of delegates drafted a statement which will be pressed for adoption by the convention.

"In this hour of crisis," the statement said, "let us make it clear to Senator McNary that we will support him in a stronger leadership and to Holman, Mott and Angell that we will not endure obstructionist tactics that play into Hitler's hands."

McNary must know, it continued, if his "statesmanship is to continue to overcome his embarrassments, how strongly Oregon Republicans feel on questions of national defense that transcend party lines."
