Still on the Trail of Bridges

Concerning Harry Bridges. To my communication of August 20 you appended a note in which you tell us that the American newspapers would be glad to get the up-to-date facts concerning Bridges and his case. That, of course, explains nothing, but increases the mystery. Now, another month has passed and the silence deepens. It almost seems that the whole subject is now taboo.

If the American newspapers would like to get those facts, why don't they? Aren't those court records, with every motion, court order, appeal or dismissal all open for public inspection? If any of our big dailies from San Francisco to New York should give one of its best reporters that assignment and tell him to get the facts, wouldn't he get them? If not, why not?

There is something so sinister about this affair that it should alarm every thoughtful citizen. If there is a power in this country so mighty that it can quietly, secretly, give the stop signal, even in such an important, and widely publicized case as this one, and cause it to sud-

denly vanish from public view, and further cause that no investigation be made; a power before which authorities tremble, and whose orders paralyze the prosecution, and strikes dumb both the F.B.I. and the Dies committee, and silences the public press: if that be true, then democracy is already tottering to its fall in America.

And it matters little, whether that power is a political organization, a ring of plutocrats, an arrogant unionism, or a race with a passion for anonymity. And the sinister feature is, that no one seems to dare to ferret out the truth and give it to the public.

If the press of this country is as free as it claims to be, there seems no valid reason why they should not study the final records in the Bridges case, and publish them.
