

Brooklyn and Dodgers Go Crazy Over Clinching National Pennant

CHAMPAGNE PARTY CAUSES HAVOC AS TEAM CELEBRATES

Train From Boston 'Wrecked'—Shirts Torn, Liquor Squirted For Hours.

NO TRAVELING

New York, Sept. 26.—(P)—Climbing of the National league pennant by the Brooklyn Dodgers will allow the world series to be reeled off without any time out for travel.

The schedule as announced by Commissioner Kenesaw M. Landis: Oct. 1 and 2 at Yankee stadium, Oct. 3, 4 and 5 at Ebbets field, Oct. 6 and 8 at Yankee stadium.

The one-day intermission after the sixth game is to allow time for distribution of tickets for the seventh contest. If the series goes the limit.

All games will start at 1:30 p. m. (eastern standard time.)

New York, Sept. 26.—(P)—Brooklyn went batty over its new National league pennant today but nobody was nearly as delicious as the Dodgers themselves.

During the four hours it took their special train to make the trip home from Boston last night they steamed up the greatest celebration any baseball team ever has had for the clinching of a championship.

President Larry MacPhail who had remained here to pass out world series tickets, set up the party with a telephone call to Boston stocking the train with champagne.

The wheels hardly had started rolling before the corks started popping—and by the time the effervescent entourage pulled into Grand Central station a

little before midnight the Dodgers were hilarious and the train was a wreck.

Hair Let Down

The Dodgers let down their hair and howled—and it was something to behold.

Somebody thought it would be a grand idea to rip the shirt off Coach Charley Dressen and before his chummy companions were finished they had him almost in the nude. Then they started on each other and more shirts were ripped to pieces within a few minutes than a laundry could do in 10 years.

All the blinds in the dining car were torn down, too, but that came later.

Peewee Reese and Pistol Pete Reiser prowled up and down the aisles squirting everybody with champagne until the kids were tipped off that that was something to drink. Then they turned to shampooing the porters and waiters with creamed spinach.

This went on for hours and for miles and miles—but you get the general idea.

It was the unbelievable end to an unimaginable tour that lasted for two weeks and was more like a traveling circus than a ball club on a business trip.

ICE ANTICS

(This is another in the series of Friday articles by Sparky Bourque, manager and professional instructor of the Medford Ice Arena now under construction, dealing with all phases of plain and fancy ice skating.)

This week we will discuss the figure eight.

Definitions of skating terms used in this article are as follows: the employed foot is the foot traveling on the ice; the unemployed foot or free foot is the foot held in the air; the employed shoulder always corresponds with the employed foot; the unemployed shoulder always corresponds with the unemployed foot.

The figure eight is made up of two lobes of equal size. They are round and not oblong. To start the right outside figure eight the skater places his skates

at right angles. The left foot is used to push off and the right foot is the employed foot. The arms are placed on the outside of the tracing and the free foot is back. As the skater progresses around the tracing he rotates his shoulders and free foot forward very slowly.

When the skater is half way around the tracing, the free foot and shoulders should also be halfway turned. The skater ends with the free foot forward and the shoulders on the inside of the tracing. He has then completed the first lobe, and is ready to step forward on the left foot and push with the right foot into the next lobe. The skater must lean toward the inside of the tracing to assure a good outside edge. The figure eight is skated well back on the heel of the blade. The same rotation is used on the left foot that is used on the right foot.

Great care must be taken to keep the free foot well over the tracing at all times. The free foot and shoulders must rotate together. If one moves faster than the other a flat surface will appear in the tracing. After first tracing is skated the skater tries to retrace his original effort as closely as possible. When he has mastered the outside edges the next figure is the inside figure eight.

When skating this figure the skater stands with his skates at right angles. The right foot is forward and the shoulders are on the outside of the tracing. Speed is gained by pushing against the left inside edge. School figures are somewhat of a task for some skaters while others thrive on them. In any event they are absolutely necessary to the skater.

Next week we will take up dancing on ice, the greatest thrill in figure skating.
