TUNA FISH PIE

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|---|-----------------------|
| 1 teaspoon green pepper, finely chopped | 2 cups milk |
| 1 teaspoon onion, finely chopped | 2 cups milk |
| 1 tablespoon butter | 1 cup sifted flour |
| 1/2 cup tomato catsup | 1/2 cup tomato catsup |
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Sauté green pepper and onion in hot fat about 2 minutes. (Do not brown.) Add flour and seasonings and blend until smooth. Add milk gradually and cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Add pimiento. Let bay leaf stand in sauce while biscuit crust is being made. Remove bay leaf from sauce and add tuna fish. Pour into baking dish greased with spray and top with rings and centers of biscuit dough. Bake in very hot oven (450° F.) 25 to 30 minutes. Serve hot. Serves 6.
