

Luck and Substitutes Give Trojans 13 to 7 Triumph Over State

TROJAN AERIAL ATTACK WINS GAME NEAR END

Statens Unable To Hold Early Lead—Roughing Penalty Hurts.

Los Angeles, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Luck and two substitute backfield players gave the University of Southern California victory over the Oregon State Beavers today—a triumph registered in the final 17 seconds of a bitterly contested Pacific coast conference game.

The two unsung substitutes, quarterback Ray Woods and halfback Doug Essick, completed a pass in the waning seconds that gave the Trojans a 13 to 7 win over the Oregon State Beavers in the season's opener for both teams.

Forty-five thousand fans walked out of Memorial coliseum limp from the spine-tingling last minute win.

The winning pass climaxed a spectacular aerial attack launched by Bobby Robertson, first string quarterback who succeeded in making himself a hero instead of a goat in the game. The Trojans traveled swiftly from midfield to reach the Oregon State six-yard line, and then two substitutes took over—and completed the job before the clock stopped them.

Oregon State got off to a 7-0 lead in the first period, due chiefly because Robertson fumbled a punt inside the five yard stripe. The Beavers fumbled the chance away momentarily, but a deadly passing pair, Bob Detham and Don Durand, blazed away and soon the seven points were on the scoreboard.

Southern California, playing for the first time for their new head coach, Sam Barry, partially blocked an Oregon State punt in the second period in Beaver territory, and soon evened the score on a pass from Robertson to this same Doug Essick, a rangy, glue-fingered lad who can either play half or end. He played halfback—and starred at the end of the game today.

The game rocked on into the fourth quarter. Robertson uncorked a 50-yard run to the enemy 20, but it went for naught. The visitors had a real line. Oregon State twice was stopped in the last quarter when they hit scoring territory—once they were stopped on the Trojan three-yard line.

It looked like a deadlock until Robertson caught fire in the last two minutes. He passed to Ralph Heywood for 21 yards, to his other regular end, Bob Jones, for 15. He picked up three yards while flitting with the clock, and when the Oregon Staters were set back to the six for roughing things up a bit, in came little Ray Woods.

He lofted a pass to the towering Essick, who leaped and grabbed it out of the hungry reach of two defensive men and came down with his feet just barely inside the end zone line. (Oregon State) (U.S.C.)

Roblin passed to Krish, a substitute end, on the scoring play. It was completed over the head of Kmetovic, assigned to protect that end of the field.

Soon after Kmetovic fumbled after taking a pass from Albert and Oregon stopped a scoring threat on its own 19-yard marker, Roblin again recovering the fumble.

Late in the same quarter, Stanford took advantage of a break, a weak Oregon punt out of bounds, to put the ball in play 20 yards from the visitors' goal. Milt Vucinich, fullback, went over from the four-yard line for the touchdown and this time, Albert toed the ball through for the extra point.

MINNESOTA EKES OUT SLIM 14 TO 6 OVER WASHINGTON

Seattle, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The boy they've been talking up as an all-American candidate, 193-pound halfback Bruce Smith, lived up to all the advance notices today before 43,000 impressed spectators as he led the mighty Minnesota Gophers to a 14-6 victory over the University of Washington.

The intersectional gridiron opener, witnessed by Seattle's record crowd, saw Smith virtually alone carry on his team's offensive to score touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters.

And it was the toe of Bill Garnaas, playing his first season, that made victory doubly sure, because the Gophers were only leading 7-6 up to the last two minutes of play.

Washington had made a ball game of it in the third quarter aided by a break deep in Minnesota territory. From the 14-yard line, Washington halfback Ernie Steele ran back to his right to pass, was cornered, reversed his field and ran down the left sidelines to score standing up in the corner.

But the pass from center hopped and bobbed back to Steele, who was to hold the ball for sub quarterback Elmer Berg, and Minnesota recovered the bounding porkhike to save its one-point lead.

It was a rough, tough battle up front where the behemoths did their bruising. The Minnesota forwards appeared tired when Washington was getting its score, and later didn't have the punch as the stalwart Washington held the Gophers for downs on the one-yard line after four cracks from the eight.

But Coach Bernie Bierman of Minnesota, astutely juggling his manpower, managed to rest some of his key linemen like Urban Odson and Dick Wildung, hefty tackles, and they had enough soup left to push over the clincher just before the finish, with the driving Smith lunging the ball.

ST. MARY'S GIVEN 31-0 WALLOPING BY GOLDEN BEARS

Berkeley, Calif., Sept. 27.—(AP)—A halfback named Jim Jurkovich gave 65,000 football fans a foretaste of California's power today by leading the Golden Bears to a 31 to 0 victory over a hopelessly outclassed St. Mary's team.

The score could just as well have been 50 to 0 but Coach Stub Allison started pulling out his veteran first stringers at the end of the first period, after the speedy Jurkovich had run and passed the Bears to three touchdowns and clearly demonstrated that the Gaels didn't have what it takes to cope with the mighty California line.

The game was scarcely three minutes old when California, getting the ball on the Gaels' 34 on the first of a series of disastrous St. Mary's fumbles, cut loose with a line smashing attack that brought a score on two plays. McQuary placekicked the extra point.

Five minutes later St. Mary's again fumbled and the Golden Bears' right tackle, George Herero, recovered on the Gaels' 32. Jurkovich passed seven yards to Dunn, then picked himself a hole between his left end and tackle and drove through it for a first down on St. Mary's 20. Jurkovich made eight over his own right guard, went to first down on the five and then turned the scoring job over to McQuary, who lunged over right tackle for the touchdown. McQuary missed his try for placement.

The Golden Bears quickly grabbed the offensive again just before the period ended. Taking the ball on St. Mary's 41, Jurkovich passed a long one to Left End Stu Lewis, who caught it on the 10 and was dropped on the St. Mary's eight. The Gaels were penalized for offside, and, after a couple drives into the line failed to gain, Jurkovich took it around his left end for the third touchdown. McQuary again missed the try for placement.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Tom Kuzma, Gary, Ind., sophomore who succeeded Tom Harmon as a University of Michigan halfback, led the Wolverines to an impressive 19-7 victory over their intrastate rivals, Michigan State college, before 67,079 spectators here today.

Kuzma scored twice and Bob Westfall, Michigan captain, once. Jack Fenton accounted for State's only touchdown with a 74-yard dash in the first two minutes of play.

TEXAS MASSACRES COLORADO 34 TO 6

Boulder, Colo., Sept. 27.—(AP)—Texas, scoring all five touchdowns on running plays, rolled up a 34-6 triumph against Colorado in the opening game of the season for both teams.

Fullback Pete Layden and Speck Sanders, reserve tailback, scored two touchdowns apiece and Jack Crain made the fifth. Paul McClung threw a 33-yard forward pass to Right End Dick Woodward for Colorado's score.

TORNADO REVEALS OLD TIME SPIRIT, BEATS CORVALLIS

Cato Wray's Run Ignites Spree—Blocking, Tackling Improved.

Blocking and tackling like madmen and displaying all the fire and spirit that were missing in their opening game against Weed last week, Medford's Black Tornado roared to a 41 to 0 triumph over the gigantic Corvallis high Spartans at the stadium Friday night as some 2,500 spectators watched their incredibly-improved eleven send six different players into the end zone for touchdowns and outplay their heavier opponents by 10 city blocks in every department of the game.

The flame of victory was ignited midway through the first period when Cato Wray, on a beautifully-executed play, shot off his own right tackle, cut back and raced 66 yards to the goal line. From that moment on the Tigers were in complete command of the contest, ringing the bell twice more in the second quarter, once in the third and two more times in the final heat.

Coach Bill Bowerman sent 32 players into the battle, but it mattered little whether it was the first team, the seconds or the thirds trodding the turf. It was simply a parade of touchdowns, an exhibition of savage downfield and line blocking and equally effective defensive work that the Tornado threw against the team that was expected to give them one of their hardest tussles.

So tough was Medford's forward wall, not only the regulars but the hordes of reserves as well, that the Spartans were able to gain only 46 yards from scrimmage. And so alert was the Tigers' defense against aerials that of 18 passes the Spartans attempted, only six were completed and four were intercepted, two of the latter being boomeranged into Tornado touchdowns.

On the other hand Medford's smooth-working offense, operating mostly from the Notre Dame box but with an occasional T-formation maneuver keeping the opposition guessing, produced 292 yards from scrimmage and 105 yards from passes.

Cliff Jones tallied Medford's second touchdown soon after the second period opened, hitting over the Corvallis left guard from three yards out after a 16-yard pass from Wray to Ike Orr, a 14-yard aerial shot from Wray to Big Bill Wall, and nice gains by Wray and Orr had moved the locals from the Corvallis 42-yard line.

That made it 14 to 0, and it wasn't three minutes later until Curt Hopkins, intercepting McDonald's forward pass on the Corvallis 33-yard stripe, eluded two would-be tacklers and sprinted down the north side lines to pay dirt.

The Tigers went into the third period with a 21 to 0 bulge, which was increased to 26-0 in the late moments of the quarter when Wray fired an 18-yard pass to Ike Orr, who ran 20 more yards into the end zone.

It was mainly a team of second and third stringers who operated for the Tigers in the fourth quarter, and they did themselves proud by striking for two more touchdowns. The first came when Jimmy Glenn, who was shifted to fullback after starting the game at guard, exploded through a quick-opening hole at center on a "T" play

and rammed 14 yards for the score. Two minutes before the game ended Hal Adams, 144-pound sub left halfback, intercepted a Corvallis pass on the Corvallis 28-yard line and, with a terrific exhibition of broken-field running, twisted, turned and change-of-paced his way back across the goal line. It was a gorgeous run, for Hal was hit no less than eight times, but he kept his feet, kept spinning and shifting to finally break in to the clear.

A perfect example of the fine downfield blocking shown by the Tigers occurred on that 86-yard scoring run of Wray's. Jones and Bob Stead took care of the Corvallis left end, Orr knocked down the fullback, Glenn and Hopkins took out the two halfbacks and Bob Mitchell liquidated the safety. Not a hand was laid on the flying Wray. It was a perfect play.

Every back that got into the game, and there were 13 of them, showed to excellent advantage. They have learned well the tricks so capably taught them by Ed Kirtley, backfield mentor. Ike Orr is apparently back up to his fine blocking and tackling standard, but has not yet hit his potential ball-carrying stride. Steve Dippel ripped off a sweet 47-yard run to set up Glenn's touchdown in the fourth quarter, and came up with a 57-yard gallop to score earlier in the period, but the run was called back on a Medford clipping penalty. However, Steve appeared a little out of condition.

The Tornado opens its Southern Oregon conference campaign next Friday night at Grants Pass.

Moscow, Idaho, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Held in check through the first half, the University of Utah Indians hit the touchdown trail in the third period and ran wild in the fourth to ruin the Pacific coast debut of Coach Francis Schmidt today by crushing his University of Idaho Vandals, 26 to 7.

Idaho drove 65 yards to the game's first touchdown in the second quarter and held the advantage until late in the third, when Huck Adelst passed 20 yards to Speedie for a Utah touchdown and a conversion knotted the count.

Huck Adelst flipped two more touchdowns tallies in the closing stanza, one to Sub Halfback Boyd White and another to Gay Adelst, and Izzy Spector wound up the afternoon with an 11-yard plunge for the final tally.
