The War Today

(This daily feature, conducted by DeWitt MacKenzie, is written today by Fred Vanderschmidt.)

The help which Russia gets this fall and winter from the west will take the form of British and Indian troops operating their own tanks and armored cars in defense of the Caucasus, according to the best of the present indications.

There has been a great deal of talk in Britain and this country about the necessity of economic aid to Russia, but very little about how it is to get there. The Russians' primary need in the next few months probably will be tanks. In Britain they are speeding up production of these important munitions and promising that Russia will have a lion's share of this production. But it is only necessary to look at the map to realize that the business of getting a tank to Russia—by sea to Iran, over that country's primitive transportation facilities to besieged southern Russia—is a matter of months.

The Russians, however, are pressing their new ally ever harder for aid. General Sir Archibald P. Wavell, who is in charge of things in the Iranian area where the British and Russian armies have effected a military junction, has been canvassing the situation—and no doubt counting tanks—all the way from Srinia to Cairo and London and now has headed back again toward Teheran. When he goes to the Iranian capital he may be expected to plan with the Soviets the entry into mother Russia of a British mechanized force which will try to hold part of the Caucasian line, save the Soviet oil supply and keep open the supply route from Iran.

General Wavell is not likely to make the error he did last winter, when he stripped the north African forces of equipment in order to send it to Greece, where it was lost forever.

The equipment which goes into Russia this fall and winter—if it does go there—is

almost certain to be that which is now available east of Suez—in Syria, Iraq and Iran, with man-power added from India. The British will have to count on this being enough to hold the fort until new production from England can get east in real quantity next spring.

Meanwhile Ivan Maisky, the shrewd and dynamic Russian ambassador who has managed to stay in London for nearly 10 years, through Russian purges and trembly diplomatic relations, can be counted on to keep prodding a sharp diplomatic needle at the British on ever-more production of material for the U.S.S.R.

It was Maisky who, almost single-handed, combatted for two years the diligent efforts of the non-lamented committee on so-called non-intervention in the Spanish war. This was a body conceived and kept alive by Britain and France; ostensibly devoted to keeping the Spanish civil conflict from becoming a world war, but serving actually to keep help from reaching the Spanish republic while Germany and Italy, members of the committee, tested their new weapons on the Republican Spaniards and drilled their money volunteers in real conditions of war.

In those days it was Britain's suave, young Anthony Eden who, as foreign secretary, had the job of trying to shush Maisky, which he never succeeded in doing. Now, curiously enough, it is Eden, again foreign secretary, who must try to keep Maisky satisfied with Britain's help.
