Torrid Battle Expected When Nova Faces Louis Tonight

CHAMPION 3 TO 1 CHOICE TO BLAST YOUNG OPPONENT

Nova Outweighs Bomber By Quarter Pound; 15-Round Fight Starts at 7 PST.

New York, Sept. 29.—(P)—Only a quarter-pound separated Champion Joe Louis and Challenger Lou Nova at the weigh-in for their 15-round title fight at the Polo Grounds tonight. Louis tipped the scales at 202½ and Nova at 202½.

New York, Sept. 29.—(P)—Joe Louis, of the blasting fists, and Lou Nova, a rugged, courageous specimen from California, clash at 7 o'clock (PST) tonight at the Polo Grounds in a 15-round heavyweight championship fight that promises to leave 60,000 spectators limp.

This is one battle that scarcely can miss. Opinion is divided sharply on the probable winner, but there seems no doubt in anyone's mind that it will be a cruel, spectacular engagement while it lasts.

This is one of the few times that the big negro, Louis, has met a man his equal in physical equipment, fighting heart and absolute confidence since he won the title from Jim Braddock in 1937. Offhand, only Max Schmeling among the many who have challenged Louis and taken their beatings appeared on the surface to have as good a chance as Nova against the famous bomber.

Good Record
Nova belongs in there tonight on his record. He knocked out Max Baer twice, among other things, and had Tommy Farr on the verge of a knockout in the closing rounds of their scrap. Only some peculiar interference by the referee saved Tommy, who only shortly before that had breezed 15 rounds against Louis.

The one time Nova ever was beaten as a professional was the night he climbed into the ring, a sick man, against Tony Galento in Philadelphia. He got it good that night, with his illness, Tony's rough tactics and a referee who looked on with amused tolerance.

"But I learned something that night," he says now. "I thought I could whip any man in the world, even if I was half-sick. I know now that it can't be done. This time I'm in the most perfect physical condition of my life, and I won't miff the chance."

The bookmakers do not share Nova's confidence in his destiny. At last check-up they were offering a bonus of 13 to 5 that he catches a licking from Louis. Anyone wanting to bet on the champion was asked to put up \$15 to win \$5. It is one of the biggest betting fights, they say, since the days of Jack Dempsey.

Talbot Likes Nova

While many observers, including this writer, have picked Nova to win, it must be admitted that they have done so with some foreboding. They aren't obnoxious about it, and pass usually if Joe doesn't slaughter him in the first round.

Even if Louis has slipped a trifle from his dazzling best, he still hits like a trip-hammer and is too fast to be avoided for long.

Sunshine through a slight haze, and moderate temperature this morning gave promise of favorable weather tonight. The forecast was partly cloudy and cooler, with temperature sliding down from an expected top of 70 degrees.

PRE-SEASON PREP FAVORITES BOWL OVER OPPONENTS

Pre-season favorites bowled over opponents during the week-end as the last of Oregon's untested high school football teams saw action.

Medford turned in the week's stunner, crushing Corvallis, 41 to 0. Pre-game dope had given the peepickers only a slight edge, although it was Corvallis' first game while Medford had trounced Weed, Calif., the previous week.

Ashland also posted its second win, trimming Grants Pass, 20 to 0, in the opener for the southern Oregon conference.

In the mid-Oregon region The Dalles and Hood River continued powerhouse tactics, The Dalles swamping a strong Astoria team, 39 to 7, and Hood River defeating White Salmon, Wash., 27 to 0. Bend, after losing the first game, came back in the quarter Friday to down Primeville. The Bend team trailed, 7-6, until the final period.

In eastern Oregon a tough Pendleton eleven in its first game gave McLoughlin high of Milton-Freewater a hard afternoon. Mac Hi got its third victory of the season, 19 to 13, but had to score three touchdowns in the last half to do it. Baker suffered a 13-6 loss at the hands of Nampa, Idaho.

Albany again was the power in western Oregon, trampling University High of Eugene, 37 to 7. Eugene High, opening its season, ran into the touted Klamath Falls squad, and fell, 13 to 0. Salem opened as expected with a 13-0 win over Milwaukie, and Roseburg looked good in downing Sweet Home, 28 to 6.

On the coast Coquille won a donnybrook from Bandon, 19-14, and Myrtle Point flashed a "T" formation in romping over Marshfield, 33-19.

DODGERS, YANKS SLATE WORKOUTS FOR BIG SERIES

"Bums" Move To New York To Get Rest—Wyatt, Red Ruffing To Hurl Opener.

New York, Sept. 29.—(P)—The bolstered Brooklyn Dodgers and staid New York Yankees focused their full attention on the world series today, even if a lot of this town's sports fans did not.

Since the baseball classic does not get underway until Wednesday, the sports spotlight was turned on tonight's heavyweight title fight between Joe Louis and Lou Nova at the Polo grounds, right across the Harlem river from Yankee stadium.

But the champions of the National and American leagues went about the business of preparing for their own world's championship struggle. Both teams scheduled workouts at the stadium, and the Dodgers arranged to ride in a late-afternoon parade in Brooklyn as the borough officially and elaborately celebrated the Brooks' first pennant in 21 years.

This monster demonstration was expected to excite the Dodgers' fabulous followers to such peaks of enthusiasm that the entire squad of Brooklyn players moved into a Manhattan hotel last night in order to get some rest and relaxation before the big show starts.

Stadium Policed
The same expectation that Brooklyn's baseball fanatics wouldn't be able to wait till opening day to set out for the series prompted police to assign a small detail of patrolmen to Yankee stadium last night, 48 hours ahead of their previous plans.

The 28,000 unreserved and bleacher seats still available at the stadium will not go on sale till Wednesday morning but, even though the Hoosiers' dropped a last-minute 14-7 decision to Detroit: Michigan's Wolverines, with Sophomore Tom Kuzma taking up where his Gary, Ind., fellow-townsmen, Tommy Harmon, left off, tackles Iowa after handing Michigan State a neat 19-7 trouncing. Iowa warmed up with Drake, 25-8.

Dana Bible's Texas Longhorns who brushed aside Colorado, 34-6, may find Louisiana State's Tigers harder to digest although the Tigers were beaten by Johnny Grigas and Holy Cross, 19-13.

Intersectional games are heavily stressed this week with the south and western conference furnishing most of the invaders.

Paul Brown's Ohio State buckeyes, who outplayed Missouri, 12-7, make the long trek to Los Angeles to tangle with Southern California, 13-7 victors over Oregon State. Purdue, tripped by Vanderbilt, 3-0, on Jack Jenkins' first-period field goal, moves eastward to play Pitt. Fordham, virtually certain to be a championship factor in the east, makes its first start against Southern Methodist.

Minnesota, Stanford Rated Potential National Champs

New York, Sept. 29.—(P)—Put down Minnesota and Stanford in your football book once more as potential champions and, even at this early date, figure on keeping close watch on Tulane, Duke, Texas, Navy, Georgetown, and Notre Dame. And don't waste any tears on Harmon-less Michigan.

Defeat for some of these may be no farther away than this week but the finger points to them on the basis of their exploits on the first big program of the new season. Dozens of other major teams will make their 1941 bows this week and a radical revision of the list probably will be in order.

Faced with the sternest test of all are Wallace Wade's Duke Blue Devils. Victorious over Wake Forest, 43-14, the Blue Devils now must face Tennessee at Durham in the game that may decide whether or not Duke is to finish with a perfect slate.

Minnesota, rated the No. 1 team in the country last year, started off a new campaign last week by whipping Washington's Huskies, Pacific coast power, 14-6, as Bruce Smith scored both Gopher touchdowns and generally comported himself like the all-America he is touted to be. Minnesota will be idle this week but Stanford, which just got past tough Oregon, 19-15, thanks mainly to all-America quarterback, Frankie Albert, will play U.C.L.A.'s Bruins. U.C.L.A., a tough luck team a year ago, beat Washington State, 7-6, in its opener.

Tulane looked tremendous in an easy 21-7 conquest of Boston college. Sugar Bowl champions and an unbeaten, united array in 1940. Next opponent for Tulane is Auburn.
