WILLKIE TO BACK MOVE TO CHANGE NEUTRALITY LAW

Will Support Roosevelt In Any Effort For Repeal Or Modification, Is Word.

Washington, Sept. 30.—(P)—Wendell L. Willkie made it known today he would support President Roosevelt in any effort to repeal or modify the neutrality act.

At the same time, reports reached Capitol Hill that Secretary Hull would urge the chief executive to recommend virtual scrapping of the present law. Returning this morning from a weekend sojourn at his Hyde Park estate, Mr. Roosevelt was expected to confer with Hull some time today and to talk with legislative leaders tomorrow before starting work on the special neutrality act message which congress looks for later this week.

Conferences To Guide
White House officials indicated that these two conferences probably would determine whether the president would seek a limited modification of the law or its outright repeal. There have been reports that the president would confine himself to a request for authority to arm American merchant ships. On the other hand, some informants have said he would tell congress he also should have the power to send American commercial vessels into belligerent ports and combat areas now forbidden by the neutrality law. If both requests were granted, only a skeleton of the law would remain.

semble an army for intensive invasion of the British islands. "If Germany should take a defensive stand in Russia, it certainly would be in Hitler's power to launch simultaneous attacks against Britain, Africa and Spain, the prime minister declared.

Expressing willingness of the British to bomb Rome, Churchill stated: "People ask, 'why don't you bomb Rome?' Did you not say you would bomb Rome if Cairo was bombed? What is the answer?"

"One answer is that Cairo has not yet been bombed. Only military positions in the outskirts have been bombed. "But, of course, we have the same right to bomb Rome as the Italians had when they thought we were going to collapse, and we shouldn't hesitate to bomb Rome to the best of our ability and as heavily as possible if the course of the war should render such action convenient and helpful."

On April 18 a warning was issued from the prime minister's residence that if either Athens or Cairo were bombed, reprisals would be carried out against Rome.

Position Bettered
Despite the grave warnings he gave, emphasizing that winter gives no assurance "that the danger of invasion will be entirely lifted from this island," Churchill said Britain's position in shipping, food reserves and many other ways was better than ever. "We have climbed from the pit of peril onto a fairly broad plateau," he asserted. "We can see before us the difficult and dangerous upward path that we must tread, but we can also feel the parallel movement of convergence of two mighty nations, Russia and the United States."

PRODUCTION OF REFRIGERATORS ORDERED SLICED

Government Tells Makers To Cut Output To 43.2 Percent Under Average.

Washington, Sept. 30.—(AP)—The government ordered makers of household mechanical refrigerators today to cut production for the last five months of 1941 to a level 43.2 per cent under average monthly output for the year which ended June 30, and warned that cuts in 1942 "will probably be greater."

Thirty factories employing 45,000 workers will feel the curtailment imposed by Priorities Director Donald M. Nelson as a means of conserving steel and other strategic materials for defense needs.

It was the second drastic cut imposed on an industry producing durable consumer goods. Automobile production for December recently was cut 48.4 per cent, and similar limitations are expected soon for washing machines, household ironers, vacuum cleaners and other items.

Henderson's Wish
The refrigerator order was based on recommendations of Leon Henderson, director of civilian supply, whose program called for production of only 2,007,000 refrigerators in the 12 months beginning Aug. 1, 1941, as compared with 3,670,000 units in the 12 months ended June 30, 1941.

This curtailment was expected to release 175,000 tons of steel in the twelve month for production of warships, cargo vessels, tanks and other defense items, as well as considerable quantities of aluminum, brass, chromium, copper, nickel, tin, zinc, mica and rubber.

Monthly quotas for the refrigerator industry will total 175,519 units for each of the five months August to December, 1941, inclusive, as compared with average monthly output of 309,234 units in the 12 months ended last June 30.

Because of seasonal production variations, the curtailed output will be only 2 per cent under production for the last five months of 1940, although consistently under the level of recent months. However, production in the first seven months of 1942 is to be leveled off to a large extent, instead of following the normal summer upswing.

WASHINGTON VICE CLEANUP AGREED

Olympia, Wash., Sept. 30.—(P)—Local and state officials agreed on a coordinated campaign here today, to rid western Washington of vice conditions.

At the suggestion of Governor Langlie, local authorities indicated unanimously, the governor's office stated, they would close all houses of prostitution in their respective cities as a matter of cooperation with federal, state and United States army authorities.

The move, the governor's office said, is "not taken as a moral crusade, but as a health measure."

The meeting was called by the governor, at the suggestion of federal security and army officials, one of whom said the Pacific northwest is "one of the three worst places in the country, from a vice standpoint."
