

WARNING ISSUED TO REGISTRANTS BY DRAFT BOARD

Failure To Complete and Return Questionnaires Punishable Fine, Prison.

Headquarters of Jackson county local selective service boards today cautioned registrants again that failure to complete and return a questionnaire is an offense punishable by fine or imprisonment.

Regardless of age or what the registrant himself thinks about his ability to serve, the questionnaire must be filled out and returned within the time specified, headquarters emphasized.

While there are some registrants who have not returned their questionnaires, headquarters blamed the failure in most cases on ignorance or carelessness in not notifying the board of changes in address as required by law. It was indicated, however, that while the boards have endeavored to be extremely tolerant, this leniency cannot be permitted to thwart the purposes of the selective service law.

Fur Farmers Profit By Ban On Imports

Tillamook, Oct. 1.—(AP)—This country's fur farmers will profit heavily from reduced foreign imports, Ed Dederer, Seattle, predicted yesterday.

He told the Oregon Fox and Mink Breeders' association that 30 per cent of the normal annual import of 100,000 fox furs, most from Canada, had disappeared.

The association announced the annual school for mink farmers would be held at Tillamook Oct. 11, and that the live animal and fur show would be held at Gresham Nov. 30, Dec. 1 and 2.

DODGE CO. PLANT STRIKERS RETURN, OTHERS STAY OUT

15,000 Employees Resume Production While 20,000 In Briggs, Plymouth Idle.

Production was resumed today at one of three big Detroit motor car plants closed by strikes of a few hundred men.

The Dodge division of Chrysler corporation, employing 15,000, resumed production following an agreement between company and officials of the CIO United Automobile Workers.

Some 20,000 other auto workers continued idle in the Mack avenue plant of the Briggs Body company and at Chrysler's Plymouth division, because of a labor dispute in Briggs frame department. Briggs supplies Plymouth with car bodies.

Hotels Hit

The eight largest hotels in

Pittsburgh were hit last night by a strike of 2,000 bell-boys, cooks, waiters, elevator operators and other service workers, who demanded 15 to 20 percent wage increases. There are 1,800 separate wage classifications, ranging from \$20 to \$180 a month. The hotels made no effort to operate and turned away persons seeking rooms.

Washington, D. C., hotel operators faced the threat of a similar walkout. Three thousand employees of 16 leading hotels declared they would strike at midnight tonight unless their wage demands were met.

According to George Davis, driver for the Perl's ambulance which transported Mrs. Jones to the hospital, the aged woman, attending a Grange meeting, received breaks in the wrist and elbow of her right arm when she threw her arm forward as she fell off the platform.

A car operated by Mrs. Elizabeth L. Garnett of 211 North Peach street, leaped the curb and struck the front steps of the Hunter apartments, 51 North Oakdale avenue, after it was involved in an accident at the Oakdale avenue-Sixth street intersection with a machine driven by James Osborn of Jacksonville yesterday afternoon, a report on file said today.
