NEWSPAPERS OF YREKA MERGED

Yreka, Calif., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Consolidation of the Yreka Journal and the Siskiyou News, rivals in the newspaper field here for more than half a century, was announced today.

The two semi-weeklies will merge this weekend and begin publication of a daily newspaper Monday.

Walter B. Stafford, former publisher of the Daily Ledger in Antioch, will edit the new daily. Albert Wedin will be advertising director, and W. G. Bailey, who also was associated with the Antioch paper, will be in charge of plant production.

The new paper will be called the Siskiyou Daily News. It will be the only daily publication in the county. A weekly edition of the Yreka Journal will also be issued to serve remote parts of the county.

SOUPFIN LIVERS REACH NEW HIGH

Astoria, Ore., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Soupfin shark liver zoomed upward to \$8.50 a pound or \$17,000 a ton on the Astoria exchange today, becoming, ounce for ounce, more valuable than bar silver.

One deepsea fishing boat, Saga, landed 380 pounds of soupfin liver and collected \$3130 for a three-day voyage. The fishing vessel Argo received the same price for 300 pounds of liver.

Fishermen still complained, however, that the price could go higher and they showed little friendliness toward buyers who competed frantically for their catches.

The latest price was \$1.90 a pound higher than at the season's opening.

Albacore tuna, at \$310 a ton, was low priced.

Ex-Governor, Wife Beat Off Attacker

Lakeland, Ga., Oct. 2.—(AP)—Former Governor and Mrs. E. D. Rivers were clubbed on the head with a pistol butt at their home last night by an assailant, who, finally beaten off and foiled in what police said appeared to be a bizarre kidnap plot, killed himself at a tourist camp.

Three shots were fired, Mrs. Rivers said, in a tense struggle before she and her 45-year-old husband drove the intruder from their living room.

Neighbors trailed the attacker to a roadside camp near Valdosta, Ga. Police Capt. J. L. Murphy of Valdosta reported that when he and two other officers confronted the man there, he fired a .32 calibre pistol bullet into his mouth.

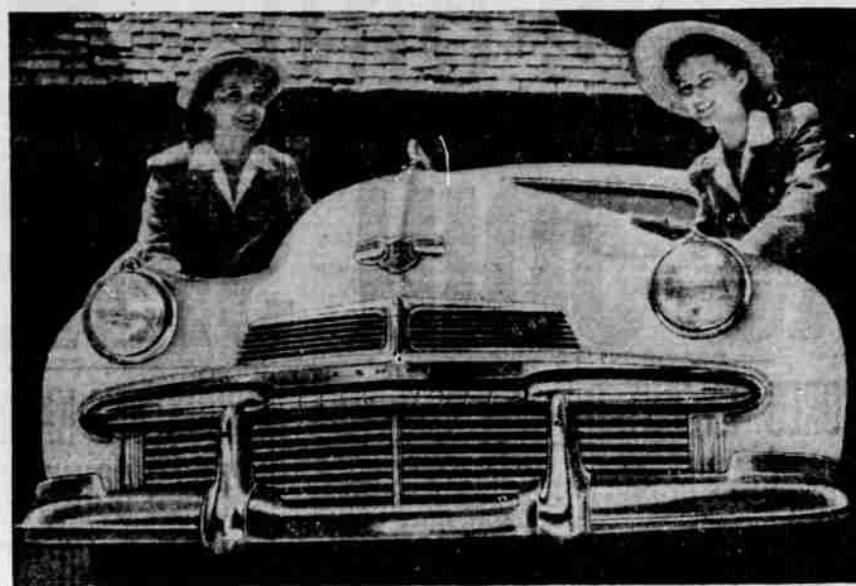
