By 1845, when all staples still were brought on pack mules from Crescent City after shipment from South America, Jackson county had attained the position of the foremost territory of all Oregon, and was the first in several lines of endeavor, the speaker said.

RUSSIA DEFEATED NOW SAYS HITLER; WON'T RISE AGAIN

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never have renounced German freedom."

History To Decide
As for his five-month silence, the fuhrer said, "history will decide what was worth more—Churchill's speeches or my actions."

He declared Germany had tried to achieve disarmament among nations and better relations, but he said, all Germany's gestures were repulsed. "We gained friendship with Italy and Japan," the fuhrer said, "but unfortunately not with that nation I courted most—Britain. Now the British people must assume the responsibility."

He accused Prime Minister Churchill of crying "I want war," although, through the years, he said, the fuhrer had tried to reach an understanding with Britain.

"He has it now," Hitler snapped. Hitler said that if all his attempts at agreement with Britain had failed in the past then nothing else could have achieved it.

"Nothing was left but to fight. I thank fate that the fight can be led by me."

"Now Churchill has the war he wanted," the fuhrer reiterated. He said also that there were efforts at an understanding with Poland.

"It must have been Providence which prevented it," he said, apparently implying that greater objectives now are possible. Hitler recapitulated the occasions on which he said he "held out the hand of peace." As a soldier, he continued, "I know how much blood, misery, suffering and sacrifice there is in war."

Danger Long Seen
Hitler said he watched with greatest concern the mobilization of great Russian forces east of the reich's border and realized the danger as early as August and September of 1940. Thereafter he invited Vyacheslav Molotov, then and now Russian foreign minister, to Berlin.

Hitler said Molotov asked Germany's attitude toward Finland and Rumania, but the fuhrer said, Germany had to decline all Russian suggestions that the U.S.S.R. extend her influence westward, even including the Dardanelles in that sphere.

Since June 22 when Russia was invaded, he went on, "every single thing went according to plan . . . I have not been disappointed either in the German

soldiers or the home front. "The enemy was hit so hard he never again will rise up."
