SHRINE HOSPITAL WORK DESCRIBED AT CLUB SESSION

The humanitarian work of the Shriners' hospitals for crippled children was described by O. O. Alenderfer, past-potentate of Hillah Temple, at a meeting of the Medford Shrine club Thursday night. Shriners of this city, with a generous number of visiting nobles and a few invited guests, assembled at the Hotel Medford for the dinner meeting and social hour. Gene Orr, president of the club, presided.

During the first nine months of this year 117 crippled youngsters have been admitted to the Portland, Oregon unit, Alenderfer told local Shriners. Readmissions totaled 134, new discharges 111 and 1,439 examinations were made. A number of children from this community have received treatment in this fine Portland hospital in recent years, the speaker said, and seventeen are now on the waiting list from Hillah Temple in southern Oregon.

Alenderfer lauded the work of individual Shriners in the program of children's welfare and particularly voiced appreciation for the cooperation extended by Medford's fire chief, Roy Elliott.

Following Alenderfer's address, Adjutant Chas. K. Cox of the Salvation Army, described the children's summer camp this year at Lake O'Woods, sponsored by the George A. Hunt theater.
