

PRESBYTERIANS OF WORLD WILL JOIN IN COMMUNION DAY

Special Program Arranged
For Observance Here—
Expect Big Attendance.

A record attendance is expected at the First Presbyterian church here at the 11 a. m. service Sunday as World Communion Day is observed from sunrise to midnight in Presbyterian churches throughout the world.

A special program has been arranged by the pastor, Dr. Sherman L. Divine, for the service here. Appropriate music will form an important part of the program and new members will be welcomed and children dedicated to God's care and service. Letters have been sent to 250 families this week reminding them of the special service. Visitors will be welcome.

Speaking of World Communion Day, a bulletin issued by the Presbyterian church said:

"This great fellowship will stand out in contrast to our broken and disorganized world. It will bear witness to a spirit which can cross frontiers of race, break through barriers of human prejudice, and rise above the clash and conflict of warring nations as it reveals its unity in Christ.

"Let each Presbyterian take his place in his own church on the day, committing himself anew to the world task and its one Master in the neediest time any generation ever saw. Let no one fail to share in the world fellowship at this communion season."

The association, meeting in annual convention, referred to its section on international law a resolution by James W. Ryan, New York, proposing repeal of the neutrality act.

Holman Tells Miners To Carry Problems Direct to Congress

San Francisco, Oct. 3.—(AP)—Senator Rufus C. Holman of Oregon called upon the west's mining industry today to take its problems direct to congress, and not to "Washington bureaucrats."

The member of the senate military affairs committee addressed the annual convention of the American Mining Congress. Without previous announcement, he appeared on the rostrum with a barrage of questions:

"Is this an all-out emergency for national defense, or is it not?"

"Are we short of materials or not?"

The Oregon senator asserted that if the emergency is real, time is the important production factor, and not cost.

To get strategic mineral quickly, he said conditions must be made favorable to "capital and labor."

No capital, he boomed, is going to go into the business without reasonable assurance of a justifiable return.

Roseburg, Ore., Oct. 3.—(AP)—Embolism resulting from an accidental bullet wound caused the death in a hospital here yesterday of John M. Winniford, 47, gunsmith and farmer of Wilbur. 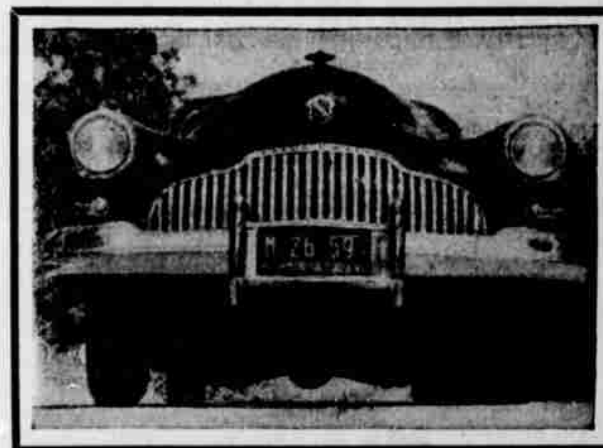
