

COMMUNITY CHEST AIDS ACTIVITIES OF HEALTH ASSN.

Cooperation With Health Departments of County And Schools Possible.

As an agency of the Medford Community Chest, the Jackson County Public Health association has for 23 years been the "spark plug" of public health work in this county according to Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, the organization president. Reporting on the work of the organization as one of the Community Chest agencies Mrs. Wells said, "our association was started in 1918 to initiate and support such activities as may raise the standard of health of this county and we have never varied from that original objective."

A study of the association's report to the Community Chest shows that it pioneered in the field of public health nursing and was largely responsible for establishment of the present county department of public health with its many services. Rather than cease its program when a portion of the work was taken over by the county, the association has continued to reach out into newer fields of public health and has supplemented the work of the county department.

Many Phases
At present the association cooperates with the County Health Department and the health programs in both city and county schools. They are represented on the child guidance committee, act as treasurer for the polio fund, and handle the sales of seals for the Oregon Tuberculosis association.

Completely on their own responsibility the association operates the dental clinics. This is a tremendous job the cost of which consumes a large share of the association's budget.

Commenting on the Jackson County Public Health association, C. E. Gates, Community Chest campaign chairman, said "it would be perfectly true to say that every home in Jackson county benefits from the work of this agency. Some receive free dental care, some receive direct nursing help, every home is a better one because this association has had the courage to start and stick with health work in Jackson county. Once the county assumed its responsibility, the association has gone on ahead into new fields with confidence."

KLAMATH GUARDS FETED ON VISIT

Klamath Falls, Oct. 4.—(P)—Klamath's two National Guard batteries of the 249th Coast Artillery ran into a rousing welcome here Thursday night.

Japanese Advance Near Rail Junction

Shanghai, Oct. 4.—(P)—The Japanese army declared tonight that its new drive in Honan province had put its advance units within six miles of the vital railway junction of Chengchow, smashed the Chinese 98th army and killed 2,000 and captured 5,000 Chinese soldiers.

General Wu Shihgamin, commander of the 98th army, was among the dead, Japanese dispatches said.

Curry County Talks Divorce From Oregon To Get Mining Help

Gold Beach, Ore., Oct. 4.—(P)—Curry county began looking into the possibilities today of seceding from Oregon and joining California.

The county court yesterday signed an order appointing a commission to study procedure and make whatever application is necessary to California authorities. On the commission are Mayor Gilbert E. Gable, Port Orford; Collier H. Buffington, Gold Beach, and Elmer Bankus, Brookings.

The movement started after a delegation of citizens declared the county's mineral possibilities were being ignored by Oregon officials while mineral deposits are being developed all over the state. They expressed confidence that as a California county, Curry's resources would get more rapid development.

SHARP TREMBLOR FELT ON COAST

Eureka, Calif., Oct. 4.—(P)—A strong earthquake was felt in Eureka Friday but caused no appreciable damage.

The shock, apparently centered off the northern California coast, was described as the most severe in six years in this northern California coastal city which feels an average of 15 to 20 quakes a year. Late sleepers were awakened and all residents felt it.

It was a long, strong shock that seemed to last about a minute during which many residents felt as though someone had grabbed them and was shaking them.

The tremor was felt in San Francisco, 250 miles to the south, and in Crescent City, 70 miles north.

Grants Pass, Ore., Oct. 4.—(P)—Occupants of a hotel here told of what they believed were earthquake tremors Friday morning at times set at 6:40 and 7:30. Until reports were received of a 90 miles southwest of here at 8:16, there was no confirmation from other persons.
