

Boy Scout Troops to Rededicate Loyalty At Special Meetings

Eleven scout troops and cub packs in the Medford area have completed plans for special Loyalty Dedication meetings during the week of Armistice day according to the local Scout office. Troops all over the northwest are participating in the plan to demonstrate their strength in numbers and in preparedness by holding public meetings, each of which will be inspected by a council officer, and at which each troop will present special demonstrations in Scoutcraft.

Not all units have set dates for their Loyalty Dedication meetings, but those now planned according to K. A. Wells, Boy Scout executive, include troops 35 and explorer troop 35, Jacksonville, November 12; troop 3, Medford, November 13; troop 5, Medford, November 18; troop 4, Medford, November 13; troop 17, Gold Hill, November 13; troop 8, Medford, November 18; troop 19, Prospect, November 19; troop 40 and pack 40, Central Point, November 20, and pack 17, Gold Hill, November 11.

Alcatraz Cons Balk At Labor in Laundry

San Francisco, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Nine Alcatraz convicts were locked in isolation today and 20 others were under guard in their cells after they refused to work in the prison laundry, Warden James Johnston reported.

Johnston said most of the strikers were recent arrivals in the federal penitentiary, including some of the ringleaders of a recent strike of 1,400 convicts at Leavenworth penitentiary in Kansas.

The convicts declared "we don't like the laundry machines."

O.S.C. Dad's Club in Discrimination Plan

Portland, Nov. 6.—(AP)—The Oregon State Dad's club struck at "discrimination against the institution serving our children," last night and said the school of commerce should be restored to Oregon State college.

Will E. Gibson, club president, said restoration of major science work at the University of Oregon by the state board of higher education entitled OSC to the commerce school.

Astoria Teachers to Receive Wage Bonus

Astoria, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Rising living costs prompted the Astoria school board yesterday to approve a bonus based on labor bureau statistics for all employees.

Eleven per cent of the average salary of 77 employees will be paid for October, November and December. A retroactive bonus of 6 per cent will be paid for September.

TANKS RAZE BUILDINGS TO HALT CAMP BLAZE

Barrie, Vt., Nov. 6 (AP) Twenty-ton tanks were used to level wooden buildings in the path of a fire at Camp Borden military hospital today when half a dozen of the 15 one-story buildings were burned. All patients of the 600-bed hospital were evacuated safely.

Lynch, district engineer for the public roads administration, announced today that Sam Orino, Portland, submitted a low bid of \$185,126 for grading and oiling five miles of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. A portion of the highway, through national forest land, will be relocated.

A processing firm, he said, paid almost \$4000 for a cargo of soup-fin shark livers last week and discovered belatedly that they were from female shark, low in vitamin content and worth only a fraction of the plus-\$8 per pound paid for them.

FRATRICIDE INSANE IS JURY'S FINDING

Chehalis, Wash., Nov. 6.—(AP)—A superior court jury here last night found James Russell, 20, not guilty by reason of insanity in the slaying of his 14-year-old brother, but also decided Russell was still insane. James shot his brother Danny, an epileptic, last July 4 and told authorities he did so because he felt his brother was incurable.

Before retiring, the jury had heard Dr. Errol Carlson, a Tacoma psychiatrist, describe the defendant as a schizophrenic with likely-to-be-repeated homicidal tendencies.

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
