

Texas Looms as Choice for Rose Bowl as Hope for Navy Vanishes

SECRETARY KNOX FROWNS ON POST SEASON CONTEST

Turns Thumbs Down On
Proposed Game Between
Navy And Army Eleven.

Los Angeles, Nov. 6.—(P)—Rose bowl stock of the University of Texas took a jump today—whether it's a safe buy remains to be seen, however—with the disclosure that the navy is on record as opposing at least one proposed post-season appearance by the Annapolis Middles.

Secretary Knox, no less, wrote a letter and combined with it a recommendation by the superintendent of the Naval academy which turned thumbs down on a proposed game between the navy and the champion army team in California or an all-star aggregation of service men in training out here.

The rejection did not apply to the Rose bowl game, but the reasons given for the official decision might govern a Rose bowl invitation, if and when extended.

Harry Myers, American Legion executive, had been toying with an idea of matching navy against a service team yet to be selected. He asked Secretary Knox if the academy might be obtained.

The secretary's reply was a definite "no."

The Longhorns of Texas, voted the nation's top team in the Associated Press poll last weekend, meanwhile must be regarded more than ever as a leading contender for a Rose bowl bid.

DONELLI RESIGNS POST WITH PRO'S TO COACH DUKES

Pittsburgh, Nov. 6.—(P)—Art Rooney, co-owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers of the National Professional Football league, said today that Aldo (Buff) Donelli had resigned as coach to return as mentor of the Duquesne university gridgers, a job he quit when he joined the Steelers five weeks ago.

Donelli's resignation from the pro job, Rooney said, was precipitated by the refusal of Elmer Layden, commissioner of the pro league, to allow Donelli to accompany Duquesne to the west coast for its game with St. Mary's Sunday.

The Steelers play the Philadelphia Eagles in a league game the same day and Layden informed Rooney that Donelli must resign his pro job if he accompanied the Dukes instead of the Steelers.

"It's too bad and I think Donelli is making a mistake," Rooney said, adding that Walt Kiesling, assistant coach, would direct the Steelers for the remainder of the season.

Donelli wanted to direct both the Steelers and the College players when he assumed the pro job five weeks ago, but Layden ruled he must quit one or the other. He chose the pros but, before returning from Duquesne, Donelli promised his college charges that he would sit on their bench at all remaining games.

Thus far he has done so, serving in an advisory capacity to acting Coach Steve Sinko. The Dukes have notched six straight victories under the arrangement.

COUNTY UTILITIES SHOW VALUE DROP IN CURRENT YEAR

Total taxable valuation of public utility property in Jackson county for this year is \$8,418,884.73, according to reports received by the county assessor from the public utility commission at Salem. This is a drop of \$216,125.23 compared with 1940, when it was \$8,635,009.96.

The California Oregon Power company, largest public utility in the county, is fixed at \$5,092,094.72 for this year, a decline of \$300,747.28 compared with 1940 when it was \$5,392,842.

The Southern Pacific railroad however, shows an increase in valuation of \$63,706. In 1941 valuation is placed at \$2,411,079.68. Last year it was \$2,347,373.60.

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company also shows a valuation drop of \$14,071.12. Its 1941 valuation is fixed at \$584,460.80. Last year it was \$598,531.92.

The valuations will be extended on the tax rolls for assessments. There was no immediate explanation available as to the increases and decreases in valuation.

LANDSCAPING OF CANTONMENT IS EYED IN PLANS

John H. Bell, San Francisco, landscape architect from the zone 9 constructing quartermas-

ter's office, arrived here this morning to go over the proposed Medford camp development plans in the field and in the office of the architect-engineer at the armory.

The advance planning includes landscaping of the grounds in case the occupying troops have funds to plant trees and shrubs or in case such things are donated by outside organizations, it was explained by Capt. Theron W. Bean, constructing quartermaster. Mr. Bell's task today was to go over the plans to see that a complete and harmonious scheme has been developed to eliminate the possibility of haphazard planting, Capt. Bean related.

Mr. Bell arrived by train this morning from Vancouver, B. C., and was to continue to San Francisco by train this evening.

To assist in the remaining work of changing drawings in accordance with orders from Washington, D. C., three draftsmen have been added to the architect-engineering staff, Captain Bean stated. Only a little architectural-engineering work remains to be done unless Washington should order additional changes, he added.

The U. S. navy's advertising campaign, begun in the Mail Tribune last week, has brought immediate and gratifying results, Jack M. Carpenter, in charge of the recruiting station here, said today.

PROTEST PLANNED AGAINST BLOW AT LUMBER INDUSTRY

Oregon Economic Council
And Lumbermen To
Meet And Draft Note.

Salem, Nov. 6.—(P)—Hoping to avert the threatened unemployment of one third of Oregon's 80,000 logging and lumber workers, Governor Charles A. Sprague ordered the Oregon economic council to meet here with lumbermen November 12 to draft a protest against a government order eliminating non-defense lumber construction.

The government said the government order already has caused many cancellations of lumber purchases.

T. Morris Dunne, state industrial accident commissioner, told the governor that the order would cause more persons to become unemployed in the state's lumber industry than would be employed in defense industries.

Dunne said that during this year, \$4,900,000 is being spent throughout the nation in defense construction, while \$6,300,000,000 is being spent for non-defense construction, such as public and private building. The government order would virtually eliminate the \$6,300,000,000 item, the governor said.

About 2,500 men are now at work on the new United States naval air base at Falmouth, Newfoundland. The completed facilities at this base leased from Great Britain will cost \$17,050,000.
