Transfers approximated 700,000 shares.
Profit selling in the carriers was blamed mainly on indications the wage boost recommended by the president's fact-finding board was unsatisfactory to the brotherhoods which had asked for a much broader pay increase.

There were some good earning statements and pleasing dividends but these were offset to a considerable extent by announcement the treasury would urge new taxes running to several billions on personal incomes.

WHEELER ACCUSES WILLKIE, BANKERS AND COMMUNISTS

Isolationist Harangues Senators As Vote On Neutrality Act Revision Nears.

Washington, Nov. 6.—(P)—Senator Wheeler (D., S. D.) asserted to Democratic supporters of administration legislation to revise the neutrality act today that when they faced the electorate again, they would be "Willkie candidates, supported by the communists."

Resuming his attack on a measure permitting American merchant ships to carry arms and sail into the combat zones, Wheeler said in the senate that Wendell L. Willkie, the 1940 Republican nominee, and Secretary of the Navy Knox, also a Republican, would support them in their next campaign if they voted for the bill, as Democratic leaders said a majority of them would.

Willkie Candidates
Wheeler accused Willkie, "Wall street bankers" and communists of "trying to take this country into war."

"You are going to be Willkie candidates," Wheeler shouted to the few senators listening at the time. "I hope he goes into the states of every one of you Democrats after you vote for this bill."

"I hope that the communists support you. I want to see you explain that to your people," The Montana senator said that the administration had been able to obtain endorsement of its foreign policies "from a few farm leaders," from some labor leaders, from some labor organizations.

"But they can't take the mothers of this country along," he thundered. "They can't reach into the homes with political jobs and take the fathers of this country."

Supporters of the legislation let Wheeler have the floor, relying on their belief they had votes already.

Wheeler charged at one point that the navy "is sending American boys to sea in ships that are out of repair because the ship yards are tied up repairing British ships."

SOUTHERN OREGON PIONEER DAUGHTER PASSES IN ALASKA

Mrs. Ethel Taylor, daughter of southern Oregon pioneers and herself a pioneer in the Arctic north, died yesterday at Anchorage, Alaska, where her husband operates the city's largest grocery store, word was received here today.

Mrs. Taylor is survived also by a son, Walter L. White, former Medford resident now living in Jacksonville, two sisters, Mrs. Fred Foote, 809 East Ninth street, and Mrs. Dora Coy, former Medford resident who moved recently to Selma, and a brother, Frank Fawcett, who moved recently from Medford to Valdez.

Mrs. Taylor went to Alaska with her husband in 1910 and the two operated the Paxton roadhouse on the Copper river and on the Valdez trail to Fairbanks. When a community was begun at Anchorage Mr. and Mrs. Taylor went there and started a soft drink bottling business. A dozen years or so ago they gave this up to go into the grocery business.

Mrs. Taylor resided in Ashland many years ago. Her father, James Fawcett, was a pioneer blacksmith in the Applegate district and his father was a blacksmith at Fort Klamath when the stronghold against the Indians was first established.

No word had been received here regarding funeral arrangements.
