NEW in today's (Wednesday's) news:

Canadian Navy Minister Angus MacDonald says in Toronto that nazi submarines are operating "off the coast of Newfoundland—within sight of the shore."

IN Washington "informed sources" (we're learning that trick too, you see) assert that Germany intends to make the waters west of Iceland a major theater in the battle of the Atlantic and fight for a decision there with "wolf pack" U-boat tactics.

Navy Secretary Knox says in Washington that new submarine tactics revolve chiefly around hunting in packs.

He adds that submarines are also hunting 'on the surface at night, making more necessary the arming of merchant ships.

RECALL here that GERMAN statistics just issued indicate that destruction of allied shipping in October, the first month in which the American navy has been actively co-operating in protection of Britain-bound cargoes, fell SHARPLY under the record for September.

American navy protection (so far) extends only to Iceland. If what we hear today is true, German submarines are moving into that area.

So look for more developments.

NEW also today:

The Japanese government announces it is sending Saburo Kurosu, former ambassador to Germany, to Washington by trans-Pacific Clipper to attempt to reach an accord with the United States "in view of the very serious situation prevailing."

He is the diplomat who signed for Japan the three-power axis alliance in Berlin a year ago when he was ambassador to Germany.

Today's dispatches add that he is not, however, among the most ardent supporters of the axis pact. He is married to an American woman.

HIS coming is interesting chiefly as indicating Japan's desire to TALK SOME MORE before starting to shoot.

THERE are indications in the Japanese press today that what he will want to talk about will include stopping American aid to China and putting an end to "encirclement" of Japan.

Significant, perhaps, is announcement by the Dutch East Indies today that exports of oil and gasoline to Portuguese colonies in the Pacific are being stopped for fear they might fall into Japanese hands.

THE British Broadcasting corporation (government-owned and therefore subject to suspicion as propaganda) tells today of "angry Finnish crowds denouncing Germany." It adds that 21 persons have been arrested in Helsinki as a result of such demonstrations.

Baron Mannerheim, Finnish commander, described as Hitler's friend and virtual ruler of Finland, is said to have rejected the American warning to make peace with Russia.

Finland probably CAN'T make peace, because Germany won't let her.

ON the home front:

A union JURISDICTIONAL dispute forces shutdown of work on gates at a navy dock in San Diego. A navy spokesman says AFL boilermakers and iron workers can't agree on which shall install the gates and adds that the navy department at Washington will be asked to decide which union shall have the work.

SUPPOSE Hitler were pounding at our gates, as he is at Russia's. Would he WAIT while the dispute was being settled? If he would, we have nothing to fear.

Portland's Payrolls Score Heavy Advance

Portland, Nov. 7.—(P)—Portland's monthly payrolls have jumped from \$3,000,000 to \$8,000,000 since January 1, E. Don Ross, Portland Chamber of Commerce president, last night told the Retail Credit association.

Ross said national defense work added 18,000 persons to payrolls in the city.

Portland Butchers Hold Out For \$47

Portland, Nov. 7.—(P)—The tie-up of 13 Portland meat markets continued today as the AFL Meatcutters' union awaited its Monday meeting to consider an arbitration offer by the Oregon Meat council.

Meade Hadley, council secretary, said the employers were willing to submit the wage issue to a neutral individual. The union asks \$47.50 for a 48-hour week. Hadley said employers had offered \$44.

HOME BUILDING TO HAVE PRIORITY ON MATERIAL NEEDED

"We may all be thankful that the local dealers in building materials can secure a priority rating and will continue to meet the home-building needs of our community," says an article in the current periodical of the Lumber Merchants Association of Northern California. The article was prompted by the government's rescinding of its previously announced policy of halting all but strictly defense building.

Asserting that it seemed a wise policy to continue home

building, the article cites three reasons why there should be no stoppage now: serious unemployment would result as the building industry in the United States is second only to agriculture; home building requires an insignificant amount of critical defense materials; and nothing is to be gained in closing the building industry to accumulate the small amount of critical materials it uses for defense work at a much later date.

Because of the small amount of critical materials it uses, the article says, "it would seem that home building can continue without injury to the defense program." It was stated also that substitutes can further reduce the amount of critical materials going into home construction.
