Wet weather and reports of crop damage in important sections of the soy bean belt stimulated the fresh outburst of buying, which included some short covering. Prices advanced to the best levels in a month, December contracts selling up to \$1.76 and May up to \$1.78.

Maurice LeBlanc of Writing Fame Dies

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Maurice LeBlanc, detective story writer and creator of Arsene Lupin, died yesterday at his son's home in Perpignan.

LeBlanc caught cold in an unheated train when coming to visit his son, who was ill. Only two weeks ago his sister, the singer Georgette LeBlanc, long associated with the Belgian author, Maurice Maeterlinck, died at Le Cannet, France.

Withholding Tax Is Urged for All

Washington, Nov. 7.—(AP)—A "withholding" tax on all personal incomes was proposed by Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the senate finance committee today after congressional leaders had decided to delay action temporarily on treasury suggestions for a new revenue bill.

George took the position that sooner or later congress would have to face the necessity of raising more taxes to offset in part expected expenditures of \$3,000,000,000 a month in the next fiscal year.

Ex-NLRB Members Is CIO Organizer

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Edwin S. Smith, former member of the National Labor Relations board whom the AFL bitterly criticized as favoring the CIO, was in San Francisco today on an organizing drive for the CIO International Association of Oil Field, Gas Well and Refinery Workers of America.
