Tornado, Broncos, Beavers, Indians Liked By Pickem

Unstaggered and still far from slap-happy after six weeks of punching it out with Kid Football, Professor I. Pickem is beginning to glow with the faint hope that perhaps this is one year he will escape with his ears in their regular position, and not thoroughly pinned back.

There remains about a month more of the gruelling battle between the professor's wits and the erratic gridiron giants, and from now on the peerless prognosticator plans to take each week-end in stride. Following is this week's dozen:

MEDFORD-ASHLAND. Not since 1929 have the Grizzlies won the marbles, and it looks like they'll have to wait at least another year to do it. The Black Tornado has too much power, deception, reserve strength, weight and what it takes, generally. Ashland figures to put up a courageous fight, but they'll be outclassed. Medford 27, Ashland 7.

WASHINGTON-CALIFORNIA. The Golden Bears seem to be rolling at quite a clip right now, and because they are at home Pickem's "chance" is Cal, by 13 to 7.

STANFORD U. S. C. The T-pot is boiling over. Poor T-jans. It COULD be a terrific score, but let's call it Stanford 28, Southern Cal. 6.

W. S. C.-IDAHO. Francis Schmidt's eleven is out of its class here, against Bill Sewell and one of the best teams in the Coast conference. Cougars, by 27 to 0.

NAVY-NOTRE DAME. This battle of the undefeated titans might wind up in a scoreless deadlock. But this Navy team looks like it has the goods, even more so than the Irish, so that's it. Navy 6, Notre Dame 0.

NEBRASKA-MINNESOTA. There will be no joy in the Spatz family after the Golden Gophers complete their afternoon's work (?). Minny easily, 20 to zero.

HARVARD-ARMY. If the soldiers can solve that scrambled Harvard defense, which hasn't yielded a touchdown in three games, they'll cop. Believing that they will, the Prof calls it: Army 7, Crimson 0.

Tornado Faces Ashland in Annual Classic Here Tonight

LOCALS MUST WIN TO STAY IN RACE FOR STATE TITLE

Favored Tigers Have Two Changes In Starting Line-up—Both Elevens Fit.

Medford's T-formation Black Tornado shoves its state title hopes and its unbeaten, untied record to the center of the table against the once-defeated Ashland high Grizzlies at the stadium tonight in a renewal of a prep gridiron rivalry that dates back to the turn of the century.

The high-scoring locals, accumulators of 188 points in six starts for a 31.3 points-per-performance average, will line up for the 8 o'clock kickoff heavy favorites to continue their 11-year-old domination of their most ancient football foes.

Ashland hasn't beaten Medford since 1929, a 6 to 6 tie in 1936 being the closest shave for the Tornado since that year. And few are the observers who sincerely believe that the Grizzlies, outwitted and outmaneuvered, can bring an end to that Ashland victory drouth.

Can Win Crown
Medford, tonight, will be gunning for its second consecutive undisputed Southern Oregon conference championship. A win will do it. A loss to Ashland, however, will leave Medford, Ashland and Klamath Falls deadlocked for the crown, all with two victories and one setback.

Coach Bill Bowerman of the Tornado announced two changes in his starting lineup, from that which opened against Eureka, Cal., last week. Roger Barker will be at right guard in place of Wes Davis, and Ray Casebeer, 174-pound sophomore, will start at right tackle instead of Stan Smith. The mentor explained that Smith's practice performances the past week had not been satisfactory.

With the exception of a few minor colds, all the Tigers are in fine physical shape for the classic, Bowerman said.

Coach Frank O'Neill of the Grizzlies, sending his first Ashland team into action against the Tornado, said that all squad members were in good condition except for colds and bruises suffered in the tough Yreka game last Friday eve. No changes were announced in Ashland's starting eleven.

Jandreu vs. Wray
Charley Jandreu, pass-pitching left-halfback, is expected to cause the locals plenty of trouble, but the Tornado will counter with their own left-halfback, Cato Wray, whose aerials have sparked the Tigers all season. Bud Provost, fullback, will provide the power-running for the Grizzlies, with Cliff Jones and Ike Orr duplicating for the Tornado.

Ed Ellertsen of Prospect will referee. Frank Hendrickson of Klamath Falls will umpire and Dexter Russell of Talent will act as head line-man.

CAVEMEN CANCEL CORVALLIS GAME

Grants Pass, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Grants Pass high school has cancelled its football game with Corvallis here on Thanksgiving day. Principal Henry Tetz said after a telephone conversation with the Corvallis principal.

Injuries, absences, naval recruiting and prospects of being unable to furnish the necessary guarantee led to the cancellation of the final game of the season, the second to be wiped off the books. The opener with Yreka was cancelled when the jinx-ridden Cavemen had neither coach nor practice.

In the six games played, the locals tied one and lost five, scoring against Medford, Klamath Falls, Myrtle Point and North Bend, and being blanked by Ashland and Marshfield.
