

State Defeats Bruins 19-0 Before Homecoming Throng of 10,000

UCLANS HELD ON 1-YARD LINE BY BEAVER DEFENSE

Bruins Threaten But Once, Are Outclassed—Bright Sun Beams On Field.

Corvallis, Ore., Nov. 8.—(P)—Oregon State college, back in the form that stopped the Stanford "T" a month ago, quieted the UCLA "Q-T" attack today with a 19 to 0 Pacific Coast conference victory.

Before 10,000 homecoming spectators, the Beaver eleven outclassed the Californians all the way with a varied offense and a stiff defense which once, in the third period, held the Bruins on the one-yard line for four downs. The game was played under brilliant sunshine on a dry field.

The Oregonians scored in each of the first three periods. Norman Peters, captain, registered the first touchdown. He snared a short over-the-line pass from Halfback Don Durand in the opening quarter.

Reserve Fullback Joe Day tallied touchdown No. 2 with a line smash from the one-yard stripe, climax of a 51-yard march. The final score was a product of the third period and one of the season's most spectacular plays. Durand, relinquishing his customary passing role to Halfback Bob Dethman, dived across the goal line and caught a pass in mid-air. He was almost flung on his tummy when he tucked the ball to his bosom. Utility Halfback Warren Simas, goal-kicking specialist, missed the first two conversion kicks but made the third.

Ucla staved off Oregon State's first thrust when Waterfield, Bruin halfback, recovered Dethman's fumble on the Ucla 10-yard line. But the Beavers were soon in the touchdown threshold again on Durand's 12-yard end run and a series of penalties against Ucla. Dethman passed to Norman Peters for the touchdown from the nine-yard line.

Ucla made its first scoring bid immediately thereafter. Ted Forbes ran the O.S.C. kickoff back to the O.S.C. 45 and a series of Bruin passes and reverses carried the ball to the six-yard line. There the Beavers held and a four-down pass over the goal line was grounded.

Both teams were exceedingly air-minded and 37 passes were thrown, 32 by Ucla and 25 by O.S.C. The Beavers made 13 of them good for 152 yards, Ucla completing 11 for 109.

ROOKS DEFEATED BY FROSH 14 TO 0

Corvallis, Nov. 8.—(P)—Halfback Bob Reynolds' 100-yard dash with an intercepted pass in the last minute of play gave the University of Oregon Frosh a 14-to-0 victory over the Oregon State college Rooks last night.

The Rooks, deep in Frosh territory, were attempting to tie the score when Reynolds seized the pass. Stan Boyd converted. The first Frosh touchdown came in the second quarter after a Rook fumble was recovered on the OSC 17-yard line. John Garrison plunged over and Bill Mayhew converted.

The Rooks threatened several times in the second half, but fumbles and intercepted passes thwarted them. They dominated statistics.

The win ended the Frosh schedule without a defeat. The Frosh earlier had beaten the Rooks, Washington Freshmen and had played a scoreless tie with Port Stevens.

COUGAR FULLBACK BLASTS VANDALS

Pullman, Wash., Nov. 8.—(P)—Battering Bob Kennedy went touchdown-berker in the third quarter today to lead Washington State college to a 26 to 0 football triumph over a scrappy crew from his own home state, the University of Idaho.

Idaho, with a razzle-dazzle attack of laterals and reverses, ran everywhere but across the goal line in the first half, only to succumb to the Kennedy bombshell in the third period. The hefty fullback scored three times and a sub end tallied the fourth, all in the single quarter.

The W.S.C. scoring spree started with a bang in the second half when the Cougars kicked to Idaho and Bill Micklich, Idaho fullback, let the ball be downed in the end zone by Herb Godfrey, left end substitute for State.

PISTOL SHOOTERS PRACTICE OPENS

A number of new pistol shooters spent an interesting evening at the Medford Rifle club indoor range Friday night, with most of them showing promise of being future experts with the handgun. The newcomers were given the proper procedure of aiming and holding and various fundamentals of pistol shooting.

Bren Starcher was high in the regular course of fire, turning in scores of 78 slow fire; 86 timed fire and 81 rapid fire for a total of 245 out of a possible 300 points.

This was the first practice shoot of the indoor season, and will continue on every Friday evening, while rifle practice is on Wednesday nights, with a mixed group present on Sunday afternoon, beginning next Sunday.

WAVE OF UPSETS SWEEPS GRIDIRON; LONGHORNS TIED

Feeble Baylor Holds Texas —Fordham Loses To Pitt —Other scores.

New York, Nov. 8.—(P)—The football season's first great wave of upsets swept Fordham, Army and Navy off the undefeated list today, saw Texas' powerful Longhorns inexplicably held to a 7-7 draw by Baylor, and left Minnesota, Duke, Texas A. and M. and Duquesne as the sole remaining major teams neither beaten nor tied.

Fordham's Rams, victorious in their first five tests and apparent sure shots for a bowl assignment, were victims of as great a form reversal as the game has seen. Matched with Pitt's de-emphasized Panthers who had lost five in a row, Fordham never could get organized against the aroused Panthers and dropped a decisive 13-0 decision. Edgar (Special Delivery) Jones, fleet back, and Ralph Fife, crack guard, were heroes of the Pitt conquest, achieved before a slender crowd of 20,000.

Harvard Clicks

There was no great surprise in the defeat of both service elevens, although most football critics felt Army's finely drilled eleven finally would crack Harvard's defense. It didn't work out that way for Army scored early in the game but Harvard, its offense clicking for the first time this season, pushed over three touchdowns and won easily, 20-6.

Navy, tied by Harvard but otherwise all-victorious, gave Notre Dame a great test before 65,000 in Baltimore but succumbed to Angelo Bertelli's accurate passing, 20-13.

Texas' disappointing stalemate with Baylor came close to the Pitt upset for sheer surprise. Baylor had been beaten three times, bowing 48-0 to Texas A. & M. for instance, while Texas had scored not less than 34 points in any of its six previous starts. Today the Longhorns were disorganized from the start although it was not until the fourth quarter that Baylor finally pushed over the equalizing touchdown.

Of the four major teams still unbeaten and untied, Duke, almost certain to wind up unbeaten, toyed with Davidson, 56-0, but both Texas A. & M. and Minnesota were seriously extended. Minnesota found Nebraska a stubborn foe but finally won, 9-0. The Texas Aggies had to come from behind to spill Southern Methodist, 21-10.

Alabama's crimson tide and Mississippi State moved into the van in the hot Southeastern conference race. Alabama handed unpredictable Tulane a 20-14 beating. Mississippi State, unbeaten but tied once, took a hard-earned 14-7 victory over Auburn. Georgia won a 19-3 triumph over Florida while Georgia Tech spilled Kentucky, 20-13.

Scoring Bee

The Big Ten offered one of the game's greatest scoring duels at Columbus, O., where Ohio State conquered Wisconsin in a wild encounter, 46-34. Northwestern was hard pressed to stop Indiana but finally made the grade, 20-14, but Iowa was an easy victor over Illinois, 21-0. Purdue played a scoreless draw with Michigan State. Detroit nipped Marquette, 7-6.

Oklahoma ran up a 55-0 count on Iowa State, while Missouri was knocking over New York University, 26-0. Kansas State earned a 3-0 Intercollegiate triumph over South Carolina. In the Southwest conference, Rice halted Arkansas, 21-12.

Cornell had no trouble with Yale and won, 21-7, but Penn just did hang on long enough to nip Columbia, 19-16, and Dartmouth had to check Princeton's closing rally to win, 20-13.

Penn State checked in with a major upset in spilling Syracuse, 34-19. Temple and Villanova put on their usual all-out spectacle and the former won, 14-13. Holycross whipped Brown, 13-0. West Virginia trounced Kansas, 21-0; Boston college ran up a 26-3 count on Wake Forest, and Georgetown blanked Maryland, 26-0.

Furman won from George Washington, 13-6; V. P. I. came from behind to trip North Carolina State, 14-13, and William & Mary ran up a 21-0 count on Virginia Military. Virginia stopped Washington & Lee, 27-7.

Ashland Upsets Tigers, 20-13 For First Victory in 12 Years

A vastly under-rated Ashland high football machine, led by two great backs, Charlie Jandreau and Bud Provost, shattered Medford high's dreams of an undisputed state prep championship by scoring a 20 to 13 upset victory over the hitherto unbeaten and untied Black Tornado before 3,000 stunned fans at the stadium here Friday night.

Deadlocked 12 to 13 at half-time, the underdog Grizzlies surged 74 yards in nine plays soon after the third period opened to send Provost into the end zone on an 11-yard forward pass from Jandreau, breaking the tie and giving the red and white eleven its first conquest of Medford since 1929.

By virtue of the Ashland win, earned in every respect, the Southern Oregon conference pennant race was thrown into a triple deadlock among Ashland, Medford and Klamath Falls. The crown will thus be shared by these three teams, for the game ended the loop schedule.

Provost, the 160-pound senior fullback, scored all of Ashland's 20 points. He flagged two of Jandreau's bullet aeriels in the end zone for touchdowns and raced 87 yards into pay dirt after intercepting a Tornado pass on his own 13-yard line. In addition, he twice added the extra point on running plays.

Medford's reputation as a second-half team was not borne out by events of the spine-tingling contest. Instead, it was Ashland, inspired to a fighting frenzy, which proved the master in the last two quarters.

Held to 12 net yards on the ground and 20 in the air in the first half, while Medford was rolling up 177 yards from running plays and 12 from passes, the Grizzlies came back to dominate the last 24 minutes with 90 yards on the ground and 48 in the air to Medford's 51 on land and 43 in the air. Ashland was held to one first down in the first half, while Medford was making 11, but in the second half the Grizzlies accumulated eight to the Tornado's three.

That 87-yard touchdown run by Provost ignited the spark that was to flame into the most startling upset victory in the modern history of Medford-Ashland gridiron rivalry. It occurred midway through the first period and gave the Grizzlies a 6 to 0 lead.

Medford had marched 38 yards to the Ashland 16, with Cato Wray and Ike Orr providing the momentum on sweeps around the ends, when Wray fired a short third-down pass down the middle. Provost grabbed it, cut to his left and behind great blocking broke into the clear on the 25-yard line and outdistanced all Tornado defenders in the race to the goal line. Jandreau's dropkick for the extra point was blocked.

Just before the first quarter ended, the Tornado went ahead, 7 to 6, to climax its best drive of the evening, a 57-yard surge on 13 plays. Jimmy Glenn, who opened the game at fullback, picked up 25 yards in two tries at center, and Orr, Bob Stead and Cliff Jones combined to advance the ball to the 10-yard line. Jones then blasted over his own right tackle for the touchdown and Curt Hopkins converted with a placekick.

It appeared as if he game were to follow the expected pattern when the Tornado, obtaining the ball on its own 49 soon after the second quarter started, quickly moved to its second touchdown. Stead got six in two T-formation plays at left tackle, Orr raced 20 on another "T" play and then picked up one to the Ashland 24 line. Wray, through a quick-opening hole at right tackle, went the distance. Hopkins' kick was wide, and it was Medford 13, Ashland 6.

Gambling to increase their lead, the Tigers saw their strategy backfire just seconds before the half ended. Bill Wall, after catching a pass from Wray, attempted to lateral, fumbled, and the ball was recovered by Ashland. Jandreau then stepped back and shot a 20-yard aerial that Provost hauled down in the end zone. Provost then went over his own right guard for the extra point to tie the score at 13-13.

A great 42-yard kickoff return by Medford's Wall as the second half opened placed the leather on the Ashland 30, but the Tigers bogged down and lost the ball on downs on the 26, from which point the Grizzlies launched their game-winning drive.

Provost, behind terrific interference, raced 25 yards around left end; then Jandreau, on a cutback over his own right end, picked up 18 to the Medford 31. Jandreau shot a pass to Bill Elam good for 10 yards, then circled left end for 11 to the Medford 10. Again Jandreau whipped a pass to Elam, which the latter caught on the one-yard line, but on the next play Ashland was penalized five yards for a backfield man in motion. Provost failed to gain, Cato got five around left end, and then Jandreau fired 11 yards to Provost in the end zone for the ball game. Provost added the extra point by running wide around his own right end.

Before the third period ended, and twice in the final chapter, the Tigers advanced into Ashland territory but were unable to score. Jandreau fumbled a Bill Wall punt on his own 37 in the third quarter and Medford recovered. But a moment later he intercepted a Wray pass on the Ashland 20 and ran it back to the Medford 49.

Just before the third quarter closed Bill Bayliss, sub Medford center, intercepted a Jandreau pass on his own 27, and the Tigers started another drive which ended when Bob Mitchell, playing quarterback, fumbled after gaining 17 yards and Ashland recovered on its own 36.

Medford's final scoring chance came midway through the last quarter. With the ball on their own 14, the Tigers sent Orr through for four, then Wray passed twice to Orr, once for 10 and once for 33, for a first down on Ashland's 40. Four plays gained only nine yards and Ashland took over on its own 31. With Provost and Jandreau taking turns carrying, Ashland advanced the ball to Medford's 26 as the game ended.

The Tigers looked sluggish and just never could get started in the second half. Their forward wall was consistently outcharged by the lighter Ashland line, and it appeared as if the locals, staring defeat in the face, tightened up and started to press, with the result that their play-timing was thrown out of gear and their defensive work was uncertain.

Provost shouldered the bulk of the Ashland offensive load, carrying the ball 19 times for 57 net yards, an average of three yards per carry. Jandreau juggled the leather seven times for 44 yards, for a 6.3 average. Jandreau's passing was excellent, he completing seven out of 11 for 68 yards, and two for touchdowns.

Orr for the Tigers made 77 yards in 13 carries, an average of 5.1, and Wray picked up 59 in 10 attempts for a 5.9 average. Wray's passing was not effective against the alert Ashland defense. He completed only four of 13 for 55 yards.

STANFORD SCORES TWICE IN FIRST TO CONQUER TROY

Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—(P)—Exploding twice in the first period with all the sharp brilliance of the bright sun above, Stanford university's vaunted touchdown machine swept over Southern California and on along the road to the Rose bowl.

Remaining in absolute command of the Pacific Coast conference championship battle, these rollicking, gambling gridironers from Palo Alto turned back the Trojan threat 13 to 0 in a game that was settled in the first 15 minutes of the day. The largest crowd of the season, 87,000, sat in on this 21st encounter between the Indians and Troy's outclassed warriors.

All records for game day gate sales for the vast coliseum were broken as 45,000 stormed the turnstiles to see this Clark Shaughnessy-coached band take on the Troys of S. C.

Stanford's first touchdown came on a brilliant 69-yard run by Eric Armstrong, 185-pound speedster from Portland, Ore., who plays right half for the Indians.

The second a few minutes later culminated a 38-yard running, passing smash across the Trojan goal after Trojan quarterback Bobby Robertson had fumbled the ball into Stanford's possession. Willard Sheller, stand-in for fullback Milt Vucinich, hit the line from one-yard line for the score.

All-American Frankie Albert, Stanford's gifted field general, missed the first conversion but scored the second.

The victory gave Stanford four victories to its one defeat by Oregon State earlier in the season. The team has threatened Washington State and its big game with California yet to be played.

HUSKIES DEFEAT CALIFORNIA 13-6 IN FIERCE GAME

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 8.—(P)—Washington's Huskies clung to slender Rose Bowl hopes today with a bruising 13 to 6 football victory over California's Bears before a gloomy day crowd of 40,000 fans.

The Huskies, definitely superior but pressed from opening kickoff to final gun, scored a touchdown and added the extra tally in the opening quarter to take a lead that was threatened once but never topped.

California came back with a fourth period touchdown snatched from the aerial lanes but

failed on the crucial kick that would have tied the count.

Whether the Bears had or had not converted the extra tally made no difference in the final checkup. Washington came back with a smashing thrust on the next series to net 64 yards on nine plays for another touchdown.

It put them safely in the lead with only seconds to go and they choked off a desperate last stand passing attack by the Californians through a pass interception that gave them the ball deep in the latter's territory.

On the ground and in the air, the brawny men from the north country had the better of a terrific battle.
