LOCAL TRIO HELD IN ROBBERY CASE

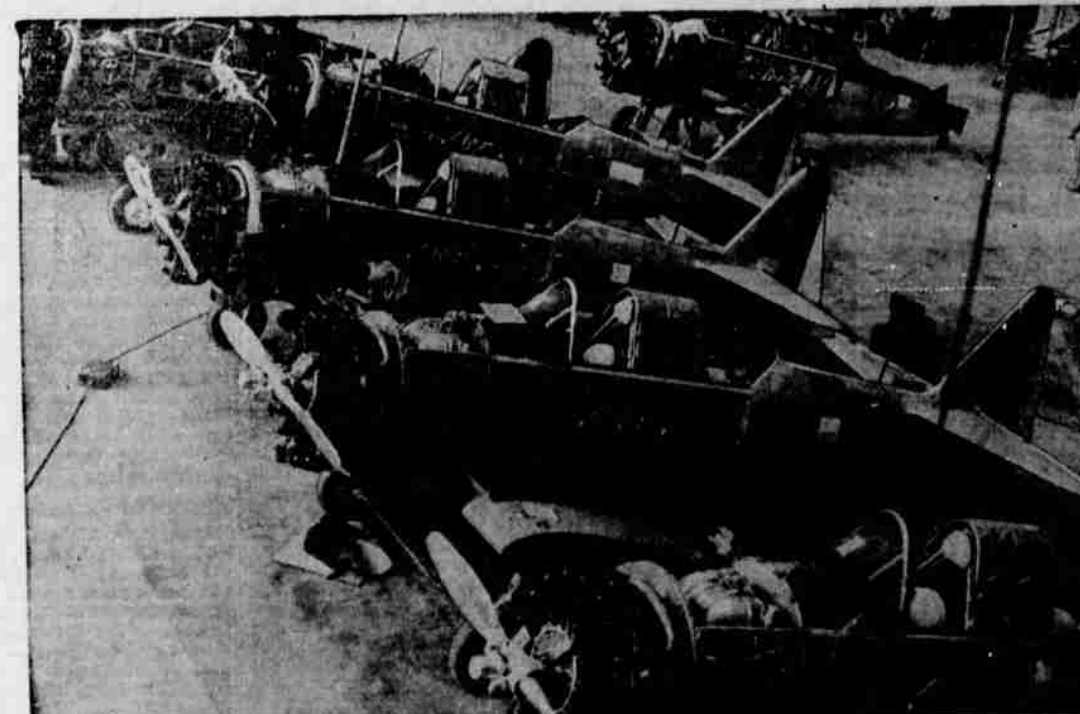
