Eight Medford and Gold Hill Boy Scouts will receive the highest rank in Boy Scout work at a special court of honor being planned for the county court house Monday evening. "It is unusual," said Don R. Newbury, court of honor chairman, "to have eight Scouts receive their eagle scout awards at the same time."
