Evangelist To Show Wonders of Heavens And Modern Science

Ernest Linwood Hawkes, internationally known evangelist-lecturer of Los Angeles, Calif., will deliver a series of illustrated addresses upon the starry heavens, at the Church of the Nazarene, Holly at First St., starting Monday at 7:30 p. m. and running nightly to and including Sunday night, November 18.
Mr. Hawkes has devoted much of his life to study of astronomy. His pictures were filmed by the

world's largest telescope and made for him by the Carnegie Institute of Washington, D. C.
The moon is seen as though but 60 miles away instead of 238,000; the solar corona and sun spots are amongst the wonders of the sky that will be shown.
Demonstrations will also be made with numerous scientific equipment.
Mr. Hawkes draws spiritual application from these demonstrations, and describes these meetings as just "old-fashioned religion in new attire," or stream-lined the gospel message.

WHEAT DROPS ON CHICAGO MARKET

Chicago, Nov. 8. — (AP) — Wheat prices fell 1 to 1½ cents today as week-end profit taking and adjustment of accounts wiped out much of the laborious advance registered since last Saturday.

Final prices for December and May wheat here were \$1.15½-¾ and \$1.21-1.21½; for corn 77½ and 83¼, and for December soybeans \$1.71¼.
Brokers said some selling, particularly in the soybeans and corn pits, was based on prospects of more favorable weather for harvesting and movement of late crops. Proposals to alter the pending price control bill to provide for lower minimum ceilings or farm products also kept the market unsettled.
