

THREATEN SPREAD OF WEED STRIKE TO KLAMATH AREA

Weed, Calif., Nov. 8.—(P)—Efforts to settle the 18-day-old strike of 1,200 AFL workers at the Long-Bell Lumber company's Weed plant took on new importance today with a threat by the AFL to call out 10,000 men in other mills all over northern California and southern Oregon unless an agreement is reached.

It was understood the main difference was over the union's demand for a union shop clause providing all Weed plant employees would have to join the union within 30 days.

The strike extension threat was served on the company yesterday by Matt Pavolka, AFL district organizer.

Pavolka said any mills that accepted order meant for the Weed plant of Long-Bell would be struck immediately. He set next Sunday as the date of a rally of AFL unionists at Klamath Falls, Ore., to decide further action.

Mills that would be affected by an extension of the Weed walkout are situated as far southward as Westwood and Susanville, Calif., and northward to Klamath Falls and Pine Ridge, Ore.

The only possibility of an immediate peaceful settlement appeared to lie in a proposal by Federal Labor Conciliator Andrew J. Gallagher for the appointment of a three-man board to conduct a hearing at which both sides would present their differences.

Gallagher suggested that the hearing be held in Weed.

TEAMSTERS TABOO YAKIMA APPLES

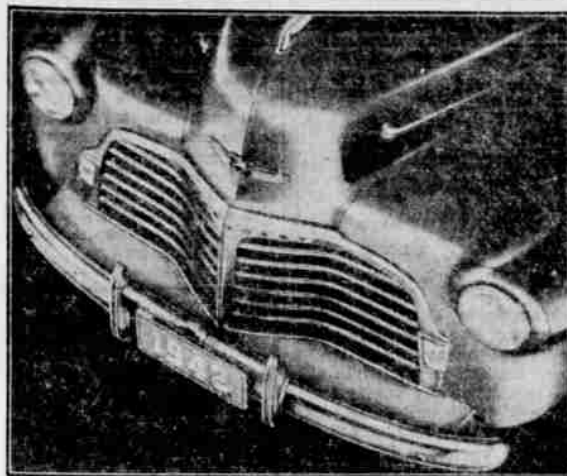
Seattle, Nov. 8.—(P)—Yakima apples were placed on the national unfair list of the AFL Teamsters union here last night.

Dave Beck, western leader of the union, declared that teamsters had already stopped the flow of Yakima apples to the Seattle market and had notified locals all over the country not to handle the Yakima product at fruit markets or brokers, to buy them or even to eat apple pie in restaurants which used them.

The action was taken, Beck said, to back up demands for a closed shop by a teamsters union affiliate in Yakima valley packing houses. Strike votes have been taken against several plants.

Joseph Cheney, Yakima attorney and spokesman for packers, said the teamsters affiliate had failed to prove its members were a majority of the packing house workers. The union, he added, had declined to negotiate wages, hours or working conditions except on a closed shop basis.

LAUNCH WORLD'S LARGEST AIRBOAT

Baltimore, Nov. 8.—(P)—The world's largest flying boat, 140,000 pounds of winged might capable of flying to Europe and back without a stop, was launched today with full naval ceremony, an honor heretofore reserved for men o'war of Uncle Sam's navy.

With champagne glistening on her blunt snout, the flying battleship rolled slowly down a ramp at the Glenn L. Martin aircraft factory, splashed into the waters of Middle river and

settled easily on her massive hull. Artemus L. Gates, assistant secretary of the navy for air, whose wife christened the great flying boat bearing the appropriate name of "Mara," said that it "and similar ships will add greatly to our navy's growing strength."

A crowd of several thousand, in which navy gold braid was set off against the dungeons of aircraft workers, witnessed the launching.

POCKET POOL CHAMPION

Philadelphia, Nov. 8.—(P)—Erwin (Baldy) Rudolph, generally regarded in billiards circles as a money player, lived up to his reputation early today when he came from behind to win his fifth world's pocket billiards championship over an opponent 20 years his junior.

\$1 PER YEAR MEN LINKED WITH HUGE CONTRACTS, HINT

Washington, Nov. 8.—(P)—The dozens of "dollar-a-year-men" on defense assignments here faced investigation today from both the senate and house sides of the capitol.

Chairman Truman (D., Mo.) announced that the special senate defense investigating committee was checking carefully on all the business executives and other experts who have flocked to Washington to accept places in the mushrooming defense set-up.

"Nobody can live here on a dollar a year," Truman said. "We have asked for all information on corporation connections, other salaries, and defense contract awards to former or present employees."

On the house side, Rep. Coffee (D., Wash.), a leader of the so-called liberal bloc, said that group expected to "expose the connection of dollar-a-year men in defense agencies with big corporations" with an aim of ousting these officials.

The outspoken representative said that 100 members of the liberal bloc hoped to show a connection between award of huge defense contracts to large corporations and activities of "dollar-a-year men" with other officials here.

Members of congress and reliable government agencies said that nobody knew exactly how many such executives now are at work here. But Representative Coffee quoted the Peoples Lobby, Inc., an independent investigating agency here, as listing 256 "dollar-a-year men" serving various agencies during June with 186 of these in the Office of Production Management.

South America, Hitler branded it "a ridiculous forgery." "As far as I am concerned," he said, "South America is as far away as the moon."

Referring to the American president's assertion that the nazis plan to abolish all religions, he said "it does not interest me what kinds of religion there are in the world and peoples' attitudes towards these religions."

"I am now 52 years old," he went on, "and have other things to do rather than engage in childishness and foolishness."

Replying to a statement attributed to Wendell L. Willkie that Washington or Berlin was destined to be the world capital Hitler said "Berlin does not want to be a world capital and Washington never will."

Then the nazi chieftain compared Germany and the United States.

"I'm told; yes, there is America with 125,000,000 human beings," he said. "The reich with its protectorate and government also has 125,000,000 human beings."

"Territory which today works directly for us includes more than 250,000,000. But the area in Europe which is indirectly engaged in this struggle already includes over 350,000,000."

AMUNDSEN ALIVE, WORD FROM ROME

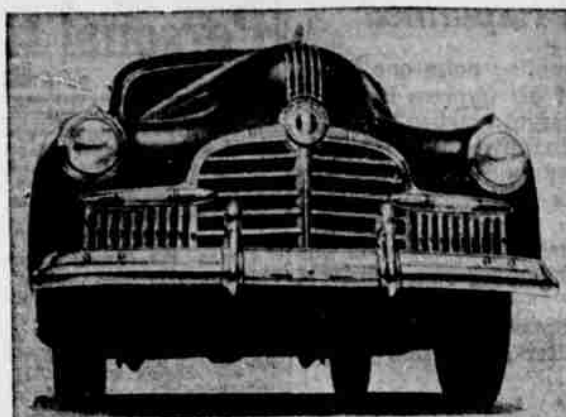
Rome, Nov. 8.—(P)—Stefani carried a round-about and wholly unconfirmed report from Stockholm yesterday that a man resembling the long-missing Norwegian explorer, Capt. Roald Amundsen, and bearing his surname had been seen living among Eskimos at Fort Bay, Greenland.

The Stefani account quoted the German-edited Norwegian newspaper Deutsche Zeitung as saying information to this effect had come from "an officer of the North Alaska Trading corporation."

"It is not possible to say if the story is an invention," the Italian news agency added.

Amundsen, a veteran Arctic explorer, disappeared in June, 1928, when he went in search of survivors of the Italian airship Italia which was wrecked while returning from a flight over the north pole.

WOMEN URGED TO ASSIST PROGRAM FIND WASHINGTON WOMEN MURDERED

Washington, Nov. 8.—(AP)—F. H. LaGuardia, civilian defense director, today called for 3,000,000 women volunteers to help put over home defense programs.

"We must lose no time," La Guardia told a meeting of representatives of 67 women's national organizations.

Miss Eloise Davison, assistant civilian defense director, told the women that the first step was the setting up of local volunteer civilian defense bureaus.

She estimated that 4,197,500 women volunteers altogether could be used. This included 200,000 aircraft workers; 25,000 to check citizenship records; 700,000 to serve as drivers, nurses and air raid wardens, 500,000 home gardeners, 1,000,000 trained in first aid, and the remainder in other phases of the program.

SOCE DRAMATISTS PICK THREE PLAYS TO START SEASON

Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, Nov. 8.—(Spl.)—The College Players, Southern Oregon College of Education dramatic club, will open the drama season on November 17 with a collection of three one-act plays. The plays will appear under the title of "On Stage".

The three one-act plays are: "In the Zone" by Eugene O'Neill; "The Duel" based on the play, "Andrew Jackson" by Angus L. Bowmer; and "As You Like It" by William Shakespeare.

In "As You Like It", the stage setting will closely resemble the original stage settings and the players will be dressed in colorful costumes typical of that time.

The play, "In the Zone" will require modern costumes. Only two tiers of bunks will be shown from the interior of the ship, within which all action takes place.

In "The Duel" the scene is in a dense forest and the "Life and death" scene will be played in Eighteenth century dress.

Designing of all costumes has been under direction of Marion Ady, art instructor at the college. Doris Danford of Ashland, and Gene Perry of Roseburg have assisted in the costuming. Stage settings have been designed and constructed under supervision of Otto Wilda of the college art faculty, assisted by Verne Johnston, Medford; Stanley Bennett, Grants Pass; Bernice McMartin, Red Bluff, and Lyman Robinson, Medford.

COUSIN OF TEDDY DIES ON BEACH

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Nov. 8.—(P)—Philip James Roosevelt, 49, fourth cousin of President Theodore Roosevelt and an investment banker and yachtman, was found dead today on the beach near his home. A dingy in which he had gone for a sail was found floating, capsized, near the shore.

Deputy Medical Examiner William Gourn said death apparently was caused by a heart attack.

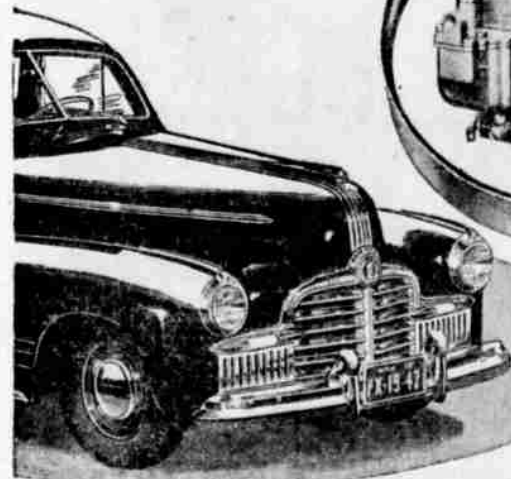
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
