Official American Legion script will be accepted for admittance at all attractions on the entire day's program.

NEW ICE ARENA DRAWS THROGS FOR INAUGURAL

Off to an exceptionally popular start, the new Medford Ice Arena at the end of South Holly street today faced two more days of its four-day inaugural celebration before any one of the management can stop for breath.

Since opening of the big arena Saturday, the place has been jammed by skaters and spectators and yet the largest crowd is expected tomorrow when all of southern Oregon will be entertained here by the American Legion's observance of Armistice Day. The parking space at the arena, thought to be ample before the doors were opened to the public for the first time Saturday, has proved entirely inadequate and autos have been left in every available space for blocks around.

Saturday night there was such a jam that persons trying to get in formed a line blocks long. Finally the big side doors, intended for exits, had to be thrown open to let the crowd in. Once skaters and spectators got inside, however, they found ample room for the arena will seat 2,000 persons comfortably and the rink itself is 185 feet long and 85 feet wide.

A special floor show by champion amateur skaters from the Seattle Figure Skating club is being given each night of the four-day inaugural celebration. The show will be given once tonight, about 9 o'clock, and twice tomorrow night during the two skating sessions which will run from 7:30 to 9:30 and 10 to midnight.

The floor show proved a big attraction at the first two evenings of the opening celebration. Sebastian Apollo was organist last night for the floor show, as well as for the general skating.

Lael Peters, 11-year-old star of the Seattle club, was given an ovation for her grace and skill as she demonstrated some of the feats that brought her the western states juvenile championship at Colorado Springs last winter.

Dainty and petite, the little girl looked like something from fairyland as she performed on the huge rink.

Dorothy and Ralph Beymer, northwest senior pair champions, gave an exhibition of beautiful rhythmic motion as they presented two dance numbers on skates. This handsome young couple received runner-up honors in the national championships at Boston last year.

A pair of youths from the Seattle club, Kenny Spence and Bobby Morrie, presented two comedy acts that put the crowd

into an hilarious mood and brought them thunderous applause.

Sparky Bourque, manager and professional at the arena, presented a fancy number that illustrated the skill and agility that took him to MGM in Hollywood in 1937 to do a skating short, this venture into motion pictures changing him from an amateur of the Seattle club to a professional. He held several records with the club.

One skater, who wished to remain unidentified, suffered a wrist injury yesterday. It was

the sole mishap in two days of crowded skating.

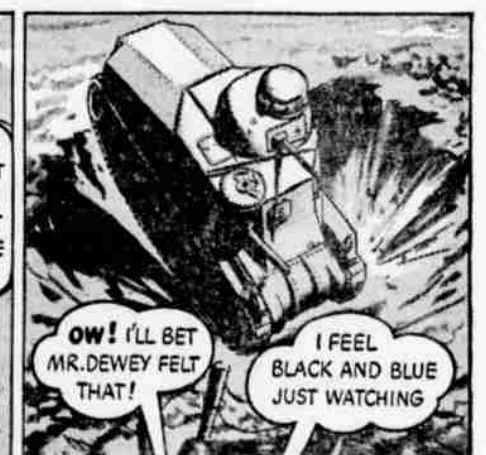
