

BETTER PASSING RESPONSIBLE FOR HIGHER SCORING

College Teams Average 13.8 Points Per Game, Statistical Bureau Reveals.

Seattle, Nov. 11.—(AP)—After a painstaking pursuit through a maze of digits and decimals, the American Football Statistical Bureau disclosed today that: 1—Intercollegiate football among the "majors" is showing more points scored per team per game than during the last decade.

2—The scoring increase results from an increased forward pass completion percentage rather than from the minute increase in total offensive yardage, most of which is attributable to rushing rather than passing.

The bureau based its conclusions on a perusal of figures on 1,170 games involving major teams up to November 1, 1941.

13.3 Last Year
It found that the average team per game is scoring 13.8 points, compared to 13.3 for last year, which in itself was a high mark for a decade. Thus, for every 100 games played, 100 more points have been scored than was the case in 1940. Or put it this way—both teams combined in the average 1941 game will compile 27.6 points, compared to 26.6 last year.

Total offense—gains rushing and passing—only shows about a yard increase per team, most of it found in the rushing column. The composite yardstick discloses that fewer passes are being thrown and fewer yards are being gained in the air.

But—the forward pass completion percentage has climbed to a modern high of 387, and this leads the bureau to its belief that the "steady and constant perfection of the use of the forward pass is responsible for the scoring increase."

The pass completion percentage has increased each year since the bureau started keeping records in 1937, when the figure was .363. Last year it was .386.

BUD PROVOST IS 1941 CONFERENCE SCORING LEADER

The 20-point field day that Ashland's Bud Provost, 160-pound senior fullback, enjoyed against Medford here last Friday night clinched for him the 1941 Southern Oregon conference scoring championship. These 20 points, three touchdowns and two extra points, enabled him to leap from seventh place to first and displace Medford's Cliff Jones and Klamath Falls' Ralph Foster at the head of the parade.

Jones, Tornado fullback, tallied one touchdown to boost his conference total to 24 points, good for second place. Foster didn't play, so wound up with 18 points and third place. Although he didn't score Friday eve, Ike Orr retained his Medford scoring leadership in all games, conference and non-conference, with 42 points.

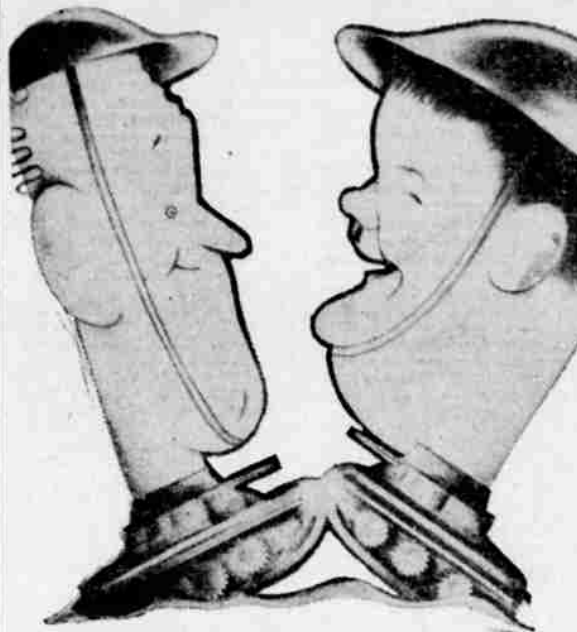

Gophers Voted Number One Grid Team; Stanford Sixth

New York, Nov. 11.—(AP)—Fordham's defeat by Pittsburgh and the 7-7 tie to which Texas was held by Baylor had their aftermaths today in the fifth of the weekly football ranking polls conducted by the Associated Press.

The Rams' first loss of the season dropped them right out of the first ten; Texas, though still undefeated, was shoved down to second place, and a full tide of favor swept the Golden Gophers of Minnesota back into the No. 1 position which was awarded them at the beginning of the campaign.

Ballots were received this week from 122 football experts all over the country, and 99 of them made Minnesota their first choice. Thus the Gophers, winners of 15 straight games, were returned to the spot they held for the first two weeks of the season and shared with Texas two weeks ago. With improving and high-scoring but four-times-beaten Wisconsin left on the schedule, Minnesota now appears a good bet to finish its second straight season without defeat and also repeat as No. 1 team in the final national ranking.

Besides Minnesota, only three other major elevens are undefeated and untied, and all of them made the first ten. Duke, with 11 first-place votes and 844 points, got third place; fourth went to Texas A. and M., with six and 794, and Duquesne, which ends its season Saturday against undefeated, one-cited Mississippi State, broke into the select group for the first time at tenth place.

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SIX FROM COUNTY TO VIEW ARTICLES ON DEFENSE LIST

Six delegates will go from Jackson county to Portland to inspect the government's exhibit of articles and parts that can be manufactured by small factories in the national defense program.

This course was voted at a meeting of machine, sheet metal and woodworking shops at the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce last night. Two delegates from each of the three manufacturing classifications will make the trip to Portland where a special train housing the government's exhibit will be on display November 24. Government engineers are to be present to explain the procedure to be followed in procuring contracts to turn out the articles and parts shown in the exhibit, the meeting last night was told. The delegates are to be named in a few days.

Glenn L. Jackson, president of the chamber of commerce, told of the necessity of procuring some of the small government contracts if employment for skilled workers is to be provided in Jackson county and if all artisans are not to be drained from here to other parts of the west coast where defense manufacturing jobs are a magnet. Mr. Jackson stressed the economic value of defense contracts to the entire county and counseled that if some effort is not made to get government defense orders this county will be left high and dry so far as any manufacturing and the retention of skilled workers are concerned.

Diamond Flynn, chairman of the chamber's industrial committee, who presided, pointed out that government officials have declared their intention of enlisting every single shop and factory that can produce anything needed in defense. He asserted that shops in Jackson county are equipped to handle thousands of dollars worth of contracts in the manufacture of small articles and parts and declared there was a good chance to obtain such contracts if a serious effort is made to get them.

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
