Tough Salem Club
First Hurdle On
'Comeback' Trail

The Black Tornado starts up the "comeback" trail here Friday night, and from the looks of things the schedule-maker could have picked a considerably easier opponent than Salem high's Vikings appear to be.

Harold Hauk's eleven will take the field against the Tigers with nine (count 'em) seniors in the starting lineup, with a line average 180 pounds and a backfield tipping the Fairbanks at 160 for a 172.7 team average, and with only one defeat marred their 1941 escapade. All of which seems to spell TROUBLE for the locals, preparing to erase the memory of that 13 to 20 Ashland loss.

The only two inexperienced members of the big Viking team are Jim Wegner, 160-pound sophomore right end, and Owen Garland, 170-pound freshman blocking quarterback. Garland, incidentally, is the only player in Salem high history to make the varsity eleven while still attending junior high school. All the rest of the starting-team members are veterans.

Bud Coons, 170-pound triple threat fullback, is the big gun in the Viking attack, doing most of the passing and kicking and plenty of the running. However, he gets running help from 155-pound Dutch Simmons, left halfback, and 145-pound Rex Hardy, right half, Simmons and Hardy, the "touchdown twins," are rated the two fastest halfbacks in Oregon prep circles.

Rollie Haag, 170, plays left end, and Ray Loter, 223, holds down left tackle. Left guard is manned by Bob Palmateer, 175; center by Bob Senderstrom, 175; right guard by 170-pound Bill Lind, and right tackle by Lloyd Griffith, 183. Loter, the big boy, is reputed to be slightly terrific.

The Vikings, whose last game with Medford in 1936 resulted in a 7 to 7 deadlock, have captured six out of seven games this year. They opened the season with a 13 to 0 win over Milwaukie and followed with a 48 to 0 conquest of Oregon City and a 20 to 0 blanketing of Albany.

Then came one of the year's big upsets, a 7 to 13 defeat at the hands of Corvallis, the same team Medford walloped 41 to zero. After that poor contest was out of their systems, the Vikings hit their stride with a 14 to 7 defeat of Astoria, a 25 to 7 licking of Bend and a 27 to 13 trimming of Eugene.

Taking Bend as a common opponent, Medford and Salem appear to be as closely matched as two peas in a pod. The Vikings beat the Lava Bears by 18 points; Medford won from Bend by 19 points, 32 to 13.

Winter sports enthusiasm in Medford and vicinity promises to reach an unprecedented peak this year, with that huge new Ice Arena, providing grand facilities for skaters, and the lofty nearby mountains as usual furnishing excellent runs for devotees of skiing.

Not all the winter sports interest is being centered on those two popular forms of activities, however, as evidenced by a letter at hand from Ira C. Jones of Route 2, box 318. Mr. Jones writes of his hope that the ancient game of curling can eventually be included on the winter sports program here.

"If Medford is going in for winter sports, she cannot afford to overlook the curling game," Mr. Jones says in his letter. "Now that we have a skating rink, why not include a curling rink?"

"You might be surprised to find quite a number of devotees of the old and popular Scotch game in our midst," he continues. "I remained in North Dakota at least 10 years because I could not bear the idea of missing the annual Bonspiel, when Canadians and Americans come from hundreds of miles around for the big event."

"I still have the old pep and desire to skip a team and hope for my share of the victories as I have been able to do in the past. I wonder how many other curlers there may be living in Medford and vicinity?"

Jacksonville Crushes Prospect, 60 to 14, for 6-Man Title

REDSKINS SCORE IN EVERY PERIOD FOR 21ST IN ROW

Challenge May Be Issued For Game to Decide State Crown—Hyde Is Star.

Unleashing a thunderous display of offensive pyrotechnics both on the ground and in the air, Jacksonville high's rampaging Redskins captured their third consecutive Jackson county class B high school six-man football championship by crushing Prospect, 60 to 14, in an Armistice Day clash at Jacksonville yesterday.

The Redskins, coached by Leonard (Pat) Patterson, will travel to Myrtle Creek to play the Douglas county champs next Saturday, and in case they are victorious a challenge will be issued to the strongest Oregon opponent available for a game to determine the state title.

Yesterday's contest was never in doubt as the Redskins turned on the heat to score in every quarter. They tallied 14 points in the first period, 13 in the second, 15 in the third and 18 in the final stanza. Ed Eilertsen's Prospectors rang the gong in the second and third quarters on touchdowns by Bob Redding and Dickey.

Sixth 1941 Victory
Bill Hyde, Jacksonville left end, snared three touchdown passes; Bob Smith, quarterback, raced into the end zone twice; Ed McGinty, halfback also scored two touchdowns and Jay Hoffman, right end and Marion Herdy, fullback, each got one six-pointer. Smith and Hardy did the forward passing for the winners.

The victory was the 21st in a row for the Redskins over a three-year period, and the sixth straight this season. It was Prospect's first 1941 loss in five starts. Thus far this season, Jacksonville has scored 237 points to its opponents' 66, an average per game of 39.5 to 11.

Phoenix Wins
In another Armistice Day six-man football game the Phoenix Pirates upset Talent, 8 to 6, at Phoenix. Don Lewis scored the touchdown for the winners and Johnson placekicked the extra two points for the victory margin, while George Gleims tallied for Talent. Talent's attempted kick for the extra points was blocked.

The Dalles had good reason for not accepting at once the Bobcats' offer to play either at The Dalles or Myrtle Point. The Indians must yet defeat Pendleton and Medford.

Dan Jessee Does Miracles With Little Trinity Team

Hartford, Conn., Nov. 12.—(AP)—Dan Jessee, a fugitive from that old wheeze about a coach being only as good as his material, is on the eve of performing his second miracle in 10 football seasons at little Trinity college.

The slim, 40-year-old former Pacific University back and major league shortstop, has taken a squad of 18, most of whom never played the game before, and molded it into a bunch of magicians who today occupy a chair in the nation's select circle of unbeaten and untied teams.

The conquerors of Union, Vermont, Worcester Tech, Hobart, Coast Guard Academy and Amherst face arch-rival Wesleyan here Saturday. If they win, and they should, they'll take their place with Jessee's 1934 eleven, his best.

At Trinity, located on a hill-top overlooking the nation's insurance capital, Jessee is given full credit for pulling the blue and gold out of the gridiron wilderness.

Jessee doesn't use mirrors, or pull rabbits from a hat; he does go in for tricks, however, as a "self-defense" measure. The middle of his line averages 160 pounds and his backs about the same, so he puts a premium on versatility and speed,—speed so the team can get the jump on heavier opponents and "avoid getting slaughtered."

Trinity has been mystifying its foes all season by its willingness to pass or punt anywhere, anytime.

"Lucky, yes," says Jessee, "but plucky, and heads up football, mainly; they go out and make breaks and then capitalize on them."

DUCKS NOSE OUT SANTA CLARA IN THRILLER, 21-19

Newquist Conversions Bring Victory—Bronco Passing Attack Falls Short.

Portland, Ore., Nov. 11.—(AP)—The University of Oregon today thanked the kicking toe of Fullback Jimmy Newquist and the time clock for a 21 to 19 victory over Santa Clara yesterday.

The Ducks looked like walk-away winners after scoring twice in the first period, again in the third, and holding the Broncos far away from scoring soil until the third period was almost over.

But once the pitching arm of Halfback Jesse Freitas came into play the Oregon lead melted. On four passes he moved the Broncos from their own 26 yard line to a touchdown in the third period.

At the start of the fourth he engineered an 87-yard thrust on passes—the longest producing a 52-yard gain—for the second score. Bill Braun missed the first conversion kick, had the second blocked.

As the crowd roared admira-

tion, Freitas started again, this time from his own 17. He let Ward Heiser pass to Dan Willis for 16, then threw a 12-yarder to Heiser. He was hurt on the next play and had to retire but the impetus carried over. Casanegra threw two passes, the second for the touchdown.

9 Straight

At one time Santa Clara completed nine consecutive throws. Coach Tex Oliver left a bevy of second, third and fourth stringers on the field during the Bronco rally. The clock closed out the Broncos' chance to win. Two minutes were left after their last touchdown.

Santa Clara made 15 straight downs to Oregon's 6, 63 yards in rushing to Oregon's 35. Oregon completed eight out of 12 passes and intercepted five out of the first 10 Santa Clara attempts before Freitas got the range. Santa Clara's aggregate was 13 completions in 25 tries for 253 yards.

Oregon scored twice on Roblin-to-Criss passes for 28 and 6 yards and on a brilliant 71-yard punt return by Robin.

Ex-Klamath Halfback Is Star of Moffett Win Over Navy, 20-7

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Moffett field claimed the mythical service football championship of the Pacific coast today because of its impressive 20 to 7 victory over navy in a renewal of the west's Armistice day army-navy series.

Tearing apart the tough defenses of the 12th naval patrol district eleven with two crushing drives and a long runback on a pass interception, the army air base flyers maintained their undefeated record.

A crowd of nearly 50,000 at California Memorial stadium, Berkeley, saw the flyers chalk up their fourth consecutive victory.

Walter Salisbury, army right halfback from Klamath Falls, Ore., scored two touchdowns and set up the other with a 30-yard run on an intercepted pass to the navy one-yard line. Bill Huters, former University of California fullback, bucked it over from there.

Two army conversions were place-kicked by Guard Ken Cook, formerly of San Jose State.

In other Armistice day games the Mather Field cadets trimmed McCrellan Field, 19 to 14, at Sacramento, and the fighting 40th of Camp Luis Obispo blanked Fort Ord, 13 to 0, at Los Angeles. Cal Poly defeated the 160th Infantry, 14 to 0, at San Luis Obispo.
