

PRIORITY PROTEST PLANNED TO SAVE LUMBER INDUSTRY

Lessening of Restrictions
Needed To Avert Shut-
downs And Job Losses.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 13.—(P)—Lessening of priority restrictions on materials used in non-defense building will be sought to avert major closures in Oregon's mill and logging operations, Gov. Charles A. Sprague said here yesterday.

L. C. Stoll, state employment service director, said 11,000 Oregon sawmill and logging workers would be thrown out of work by February if the present trend continued. He told lumber operators and the Oregon Economic council that 5,000 Portland construction and 5,000 in heavy industries workers would be jobless.

Stoll said certain priorities had drastically curtailed non-defense building with the result that many mills already had made sharp reduction in their operations.

Governor Sprague said he had asked Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington to join in a protest to the OPM.

James Bryant, San Francisco, regional social security board director and labor supply board chairman, said he would ask the OPM to send two men to Oregon to study the situation.

Standard First Aid Instruction Offered Starting Next Week

A new standard first aid course, combining first aid and the defense program, is being offered to Copco employees and other interested Jackson county men beginning Tuesday at 7 p. m. in the Red Cross rooms in the county courthouse.

Instructor for the 20-hour course will be Harold Bither, according to an announcement made today by C. C. Hagard, Red Cross first aid chairman for Jackson county. Supplemental work has been added to the standard first aid course, Hagard explained, to round out necessary war defense information for use in civilian defense.

Men interested in joining the group are asked to telephone the Red Cross office. There is no charge for the course except the cost of the textbook. The class is being sponsored by Copco.

EARLY TRAPPING BRINGS \$25 FINE

David T. Thomas, a mill worker doing trapping on the side, entered a plea of guilty to trapping furbearing animals out of season and was assessed \$25 and costs in justice court today. He was given 30 days to pay the fine, after paying the \$4.50 costs. The state game department confiscated 13 muskrat pelts, and returned traps and gun to Thomas.

The fur trapping season does not open until November 15, and muskrats are bringing the best price in several years.

Quentin Matthews and Raymond Wooley, of the Eagle Point district, are serving out \$25 and costs fines in the county jail, upon pleading guilty to trapping out of season. They were given an opportunity to pay on the installment plan, but decided afterwards to languish in the bastille at \$2 per day.

Reports on a recent inquiry sent out to former navy men who were still following the skilled trades they had learned in the navy showed the average salary of these workers to be \$165 per month.

Cigarette Butts At Record High On Paris "Curb"

Vichy, Unoccupied France, Nov. 13.—(P)—The price of cigarette butts in Paris has reached the new high of 25 francs (about 55 cents) for 50, reports from the unoccupied capital said today.

Butt dealers—a new business—reported a greater demand than they were able to satisfy.

30-Ton Tank Crosses American Lake Over Army Pontoon Bridge

Tacoma, Nov. 13.—(P)—In the first successful test of its kind west of the Mississippi, new 30-ton tanks, bristling with cannon and machine guns, yesterday negotiated the length of a 214 foot pontoon bridge laid across an arm of American lake, near Tacoma.

The bridge, constructed by the first United States army pontoon battalion organized in the west, consisted of 22 aluminum pontoons which were 32 feet long, six and a half feet wide and nearly four feet deep.

Crossing the bridge one at a time, the tanks caused only a slight sagging and officers said the tests showed that two could safely cross at a time.

The pontoons were brought to the lake on huge army prime-movers (trucks) and lifted into the water by cranes. An outboard motor was then attached to facilitate movement.

Officers said the pontoons can carry 100 soldiers each and, without reinforcing, the bridge can carry 25 tons. Reinforced, a load of 45 to 50 tons was believed possible.

Chief Roy Elliott announced today that lots of old toys are needed immediately so that the firemen may get started on the rebuilding project. Only a few have been received thus far, he said, adding that in their new workshop the firemen can handle more toys at one time than ever before.

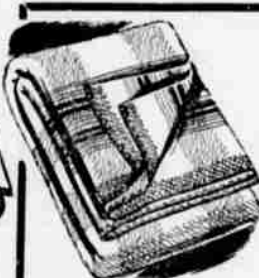
