A Saddle Horse With a 'Set-Tail'
To the editor: The banner on the Humane society's ambulance appearing in the Armistice Day parade read: "In Memory of Horses, Mules and Dogs Killed in the World War"; bringing these facts to mind:

Dogs were used for their quicker sense in detecting gas and approaching danger. They were capable of following trails, searching premises and identifying persons under suspicion.

Red Cross dogs were used after battle to search devastated areas for the wounded. Anything such dogs could take from a fallen soldier they carried back to the lines and then led stretcher-bearers to the injured.

Horses, mules and camels were the main stays of the transport serving the fronts with food, water, kitchens, ambulances, artillery, tons of shells and munitions.

Over 8,000 horses died in the World war from wounds, exhaustion, exposure, and disease, in spite of veterinary care; 68,000 R.A.F. mules were sacrificed; 30,000 camels died in one Egyptian campaign. Carrier pigeons, canaries, rabbits and white mice played their part.

It is fitting and proper that we should remember and duly praise these thousands of animals that died nobly in our cause. The soldiers responsible for their care have not forgotten them.

With Armistice day in mind the public seems to remember the unavoidable suffering of these animals in the World war for our telephone has rung with criticism of an outstanding act of needless cruelty to animals displayed in our parade.

A beautiful horse with its "tail set" for no reason at all other than to satisfy the vanity of the owner.

"Tail-setting", "cropping", etc. is prohibited by law in most of our states on the grounds of the cruelty involved.

The operation consists in cutting the strong flexor muscles on each side of the tail at its base near the body. The tail is then bent up at nearly a right angle, tightly banded and held by mechanical devices in this position until the wounds heal.

These wounds sometimes become infected and the healing process takes weeks. If the tail fails to set straight up, more operations are necessary. When once the wounds heal the tail must be kept unnaturally supported for hours preceding being ridden in public.

Fashion inflicts no greater cruelty to animals than this. "Tail-setting" with horses is as out-moded today as "ear-cropping" with dogs. Today you can not show an "ear-cropped" dog in any registered bench show in the United States.

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DORRIS CASHIER ADMITS MISDEED

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 13.—(P)—The case of Clifford W. Severts, former cashier-secretary of the Butte Valley State bank at Dorris, was referred to the U. S. probation officer for report today after he pleaded guilty to a charge of violation of the Federal Reserve bank act by making a false entry.

Federal Judge Martin I. Welsh ordered Severts into the custody of the United States marshal pending a hearing on the probation report November 22.

Severts was charged with taking \$2,500 in bank funds through making false entries. Emmet J. Seawell, assistant United States attorney, said an investigation of books at the bank disclosed a total of \$19,930 in bank funds was taken over a period of 17 years.
