

DEALERS IN DIXIE AIDED IN PROPER PEAR PREPARATION

Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau Head Reports Work In South.

Seattle (Sp)—A nickel or a dime premium on a box of conditioned pears in Mississippi is encouraging fruit dealers in that section to properly prepare winter pears for immediate eating by the consumer, according to E. R. Pooley, president-manager of the Oregon-Washington-California Pear Bureau. These southern dealers were recently contacted by Dick Patterson, pear bureau representative who found Anjous about to replace Howells, with a few Flemish Beauties ordered. Dealers at Birmingham, Ala., expressed appreciation for pear bureau work in the past, and were planning on going into Anjous heavier this year.

About varieties available, Patterson reports: "Quite a few Bosc were offered, with some Bartlett's, a few Anjous, some Seckels and Flemish Beauties." Anjous were hard green and no conditioning was done, as the weather was fairly warm in New York, where Patterson was stationed.

Employment Service Chalks Up Record in Aiding Farm Workers

Salem, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The state employment service said today it had found jobs during the first 10 months of this year for 132,736 agricultural workers, a new high, and 30,001 more than during all of last year.

The Salem area led the 23 employment offices with 36,895 farm placements, of which 30,897 were in the bean, hop and prune harvests during August and September. Portland was next with 29,381, followed by Ontario 11,341, Hood River 8,135, Medford 8,088, Pendleton 8,194, Klamath Falls 5,874, McMinnville 5,755, Eugene 3,823, Corvallis 3,330, Albany 2,966, Oregon City 2,993 and Bend 2,097.

With the exception of calling a few hundred families from California's central valley for berry picking, most of Oregon's harvest emergencies were met with Oregon workers, the service said.

Giant Ad Campaign Planned by Florida Citrus Commission

Lakeland, Fla., Nov. 13.—(AP)—About December 1 the Florida citrus commission plans to begin its \$875,000 national advertising campaign to sell oranges, grapefruit and tangerines.

Newspapers, magazines, the radio and direct promotion work with retailers will be used.

Most fresh fruit advertising will be placed in daily newspapers.

The season's program outlined to the citrus commission yesterday by Granville Rutledge, its advertising manager, and by representatives of Blackett Sample-Hummert, Inc., its advertising agency.

JOHN TAXPAYER PROTESTS PLAN FOR NEW LEVIES

Those Who Haven't Had Pay Boosts Deny 'Excess Purchasing Power' Claim

Washington, Nov. 13.—(AP)—John Taxpayer and hundreds of his brothers who haven't had a pay raise in a long time poured protests into the treasury today against new tax proposals designed to "mop up" excess purchasing power.

The treasury admitted getting a "large number" of letters from citizens who generally said "what's this excess purchasing power? I haven't got any of it."

Hard Problem

Answers are going out that the treasury is "aware" of the problem of the many people who haven't shared directly in the defense boom, and is trying to work out some tax system that will be easier on them than on the other workers who are making lots more money. But, one official commented, "we can't make promises. It's a difficult nut to crack."

The thing that started the indignant flood of mail was a statistical survey by Dr. Carl Shoup of Columbia university, a part-time treasury adviser, which predicted that the people would have between \$5,000,000,000 and \$8,000,000,000 of extra spending money next year, at a time when priorities and other factors would reduce sharply the supply of merchandise the people could buy. Shoup concluded that unless the treasury soaked up some of this spare
