Tiger Principal  
Formerly Coached  
Ashland Head Man

Frank O'Neill, who in our opinion has performed a minor miracle in coaching Ashland high out of the football doldrums, played for the Grants Pass Cavemen in 1930 and 1931 when Leonard B. Mayfield, present Medford principal, was coaching the Climate city eleven.

Seattle, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Jimmy Phelan, plotting Washington's football tactics against Oregon here a week from Saturday, described the Webfoots today as a team with kicking, passing, power, speed and punch.

He warned the Huskies, as they resumed practice, that Oregon has the biggest eleven in the conference, with plenty of reinforcements. Phelan made his report after witnessing Oregon's 21-19 victory over Santa Clara on Armistice day.

## NORTHWESTERN TO GIVE NOTRE DAME HARDEST CONTEST

Small Squad To Carry Irish Load, Unlike Days of Rockne 'Shock Troops.'

Evanston, Ill., Nov. 13.—(AP)—An 11-year gap in Notre Dame football fortunes challenges a little band of fighting Irish who'll charge into Northwestern's tough Wildcats at Dwyer stadium next Saturday.

It's a far cry back to 1930, Knute Rockne and Notre Dame's last undefeated team, one which won 10 games and lost none. That team—and many before it—had reserve strength in every position, with Rockne using shock troops pulled from third, fourth and fifth elevens.

It's different with the 1941 Irish under Frank Leahy, who started practice with a comparatively slim half-hundred candidates. From that half-hundred Leahy culled some 20 players who have carried the load through seven games without defeat. And Notre Dame believes those players will be good enough to take the Northwestern hurdle before winding up with a triumph over Southern California next week.

Slight Favorites Given a dry field, Notre Dame will be slight favorites to take Saturday's battle, to be played before a sell-out crowd of 48,000 fans. The Irish are fast, and their supporters believe that Steve Juzwik, a great running halfback, is due to hit his peak. Owen Evans always is a threat. And then there is sophomore Angelo Bertelli.

Bertelli already ranks as one of the greatest first-year passers in recent intercollegiate history. Through seven games he has completed 52 out of 89 tosses for 813 yards. He's had almost perfect protection, in some games getting as much as 8 to 10 seconds to spot his receivers. His biggest test will come Saturday—against Northwestern's line.

## TORNADO-VIKING TILT TOPS SLATE

Only a handful of games are on tap this week-end as Oregon high school football play shifts almost exclusively to western and southern sections of the state.

None of the unbeaten teams go into action, but two of the sectional leaders, Salem and Medford, will meet in the southern Oregon city.

Both high-scoring machines, Salem currently is tied with Corvallis for the No. 1 name league lead and Medford with Ashland and Klamath Falls for the Southern Oregon conference title.

Ashland also engages in an inter-sectional contest, traveling to Astoria. Albany, a team that could tie Salem and Corvallis in No. 1 name play by defeating Eugene Thanksgiving day, will rest, but Eugene will polish its offense against lowly Milwaukie.

## DOZEN TIGERS TO PLAY FINAL HOME CONTEST FRIDAY

Eight Regulars Climax Grid Careers Against Vikings—Blocking Is Stressed.

When Medford clashes with the big, fast and tough Salem high Vikings here Friday night in the final home game of the 1941 season, a dozen members of the Black Tornado squad, including eight regulars, will be throwing their last blocks and tackles before a home town crowd. Those 12 are seniors, and will be saying farewell to prep gridiron activities in the local stadium.

Of the starting eleven, only Bud Mayfield, left tackle; Stan Smith, right tackle and Cliff Jones, fullback, will be wearing the red and black again next season. They are juniors. Five regulars will bring to a climax three years of performing on the local turf. They are Curt Hopkins and Bill Wall, ends; Bob Stead, quarterback, and Ike Orr and Cato Wray, halfbacks. Dan Winter, center; Wes Davis and Bob Mitchell, guards, played one previous season prior to this year.

Four Reserves Finish

Of the reserves, Jimmy Glenn, two-year letterman guard and fullback; Lee Reynolds, end; Jack Pope, center, and Ivan Cherry, tackle, are seniors and will be dressing for their final home game.

In practice sessions this week, Coach Bill Bowerman has been stressing downfield blocking in an attempt to regenerate the Tornado running attack, which bogged down badly in the second half of the Ashland game. Also coming in for its share of attention has been defensive work designed to prevent Dutch Simmons and Rex Hardy, Salem's "touchdown twins," from breaking into the clear for touchdown scampers.

## Louis To Give Profits of Baer Fight to Navy Relief

New York, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis has been paid princely sums for skidding to the vanishing point.

Within a few weeks he will be inducted into the army to fight, if necessary, for \$21 a month and now he has agreed to fight for the navy for nothing.

A 15-round title bout between the champion and Buddy Baer, the big Californian he beat in six rounds last spring, was announced last night for Jan. 9 in Madison Square Garden.

The profits will go to the New York auxiliary of the navy relief society and Louis will receive nothing more than his expenses for staking his heavyweight crown, the most valuable bauble in sports.

Rear Admiral Adolphus Andrews, commandant of the third naval district and commander of the north Atlantic naval coastal frontier, announced the match, which was arranged for him by Promoter Mike Jacobs. Aside from the fact that Louis will be donating his services, the financial arrangements for the champion's 20th defense of his title were not disclosed.

But Ancil Hoffman, Baer's manager, said in Sacramento, Calif., that Buddy would receive the customary challenger's percentage after taxes and a 10 percent cut for the navy had been taken off the top. In the past Louis' challengers have received from 12½ to 20 percent.

## Arizona Takes First in Offense Figures; Duke Rises to Second

Seattle, Nov. 13.—(AP)—The rise of Arizona and Duke and the fall of Texas and Texas A. & M., featured last week's yardstick battles for total offensive and defensive football statistical supremacy.

American football statistical bureau figures released today showed the undefeated Texas Longhorns, first a week ago, suffered more than a blow at their prestige in being tied, 7-7, by Baylor. The Texans dropped from first to fourth as a total offensive unit.

Meanwhile, Arizona, winning its sixth straight game after losing its opener to Notre Dame, moved into first place with a 383.6 yard average per game from rushes and passes.

And Duke, 13th a week ago, rolled up 700 yards in pummeling Davidson, 56-0, to go into second place with a 372.7 yard average.

Chicago, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Big Ed Dudley, a star tournament performer in the Professional Golfers association, today had a new starring role—as PGA president.

Dudley, 39 year old pro at Broadmoor country club, Colorado Springs and three time member of the Ryder Cup team, was selected yesterday to succeed Tom Walsh of Chicago, who declined to run for a third term.

It was the first time the PGA ever had selected a president from its playing stars.
