JONES DECLARED INELIGIBLE DUE TO POOR GRADES

Ike Orr Moved To Fullback —Dippel Placed At Right Half—Turf Mushy.

"We should be able to stay within three touchdowns of them."

Thus did Coach Bill Bowerman sum up Medford's chances today as the Black Tornado, desperately crippled in the backfield by the announcement that Cliff Jones, regular fullback, was ineligible for the clash, prepared to face Salem high's massive Vikings at the stadium tonight in the final home game of the 1941 season. The kickoff is at 8 o'clock.

Jones, the coach explained, was declared ineligible for the contest because he was "down" in two subjects, and said there was absolutely no chance the 166-pound junior would get into action.

To make this blow all the more severe, the mentor said that Jimmy Glenn, guard and second-string fullback, would be unable to see service at fullback because of charley horses in both legs. So, with both his fullbacks sidelined, Bowerman has shifted Ike Orr, regular right halfback, into the fullback spot and inserted 154-pound Steve Dippel, Orr's understudy, into the right halfback slot.

"Tough Job"

"It will be a tough job for Orr tonight, as he hasn't been playing fullback and hasn't had time to thoroughly learn the assignments on the 'T' plays," the coach stated. "He knows the Notre Dame box fullback assignments because he played fullback last year, but on our 'T' plays I don't know what will happen. We'll just have to hope for the best."

The balance of the Tornado lineup is in good condition, the coach said, and added that Wes Davis and Stan Smith, who

didn't open the Ashland game, will be back at right guard and right tackle, respectively. There will be no other starting changes.

With the stadium turf almost certain to be mushy after the rain, both elevens will probably be somewhat handicapped on offense, as both rely on speed, ball-handling and passing. On defense, Salem's slight weight advantage in the line and backfield may prove valuable.

Viks Potent

The Harold Hawk Vikings, only once-defeated and co-leaders of the powerful No-Name league, operate from the Warner formation "B," a double wing setup featuring reverses, spinners and deception. Dutch Simmons and Rex Hardy, the half-back "touchdown twins," and Bud Coons, triple-threat fullback, carry the offensive burden behind a 180-pound forward wall led by 223-pound Ray Loter, left tackle. All the backs, including Quarterback Owen Garland, are forward passing experts.

Ivan Harrington of Medford will referee, Ed Eliertsen of Prospect will umpire and George Robertson of Medford will act as head linesman. One of the season's largest crowds is expected to watch the Tornado ring down the curtain on its home schedule, and attempt to regain its winning form against the most powerful eleven in the Willamette valley.

NO SHOOT AT MEDFORD CLUB COMING SUNDAY

Ex-Waterboy Third Best Aerial Artist; Tommervick Second

Seattle, Nov. 14.—(P)—As a waterboy, about the only pass he ever made was with a wet towel—until one day Head Coach Fuzz Merritt of Pomona college saw him flinging left-handed passes to an assistant manager.

So the erstwhile waterboy, 149 pounds of him named Billy Kern, was drafted for halfback duties a few weeks back, and today he's in third place among the leading pass-pitchers in the American football statistical bureau's rankings of minor college performers. He's completed 35 of 70 passes for 354 yards.

The passing leader is Doug Rehner of the Dickinson Red Devils at Carlisle, Pa. Playing with a losing club Rehner has completed 77 passes out of 156 attempts for 831 yards.

In second place, but with much more effective tossing, and playing for a team that's won 17 straight, is Marvin "Tommygun" Tommervick, the little all-America halfback from Pacific Lutheran college near Tacoma, Wash. Tommervick has completed as many as Rehner has complete—77—and found his target with 45 of these for the high total of 898 yards.

With Tommervick's 516 rushing yards, he's amassed 1,414 yards to lead the minors in total offense. Since his team signed to play College of the Pacific at Tacoma November 29, Tommervick has three more games, including tonight's against weak Linfield, in order to become the first in bureau history to amass 2,000 yards in one season.

TAMI AND GUS TO FIGHT FOR TITLE

New York, Nov. 14.—(P)—Gus Lesnevich of Cliffside, N. J., and Tami Mauriello of the Bronx swap punches for the second time in three months tonight in a battle for the world's light heavyweight crown which Lesnevich wears with the approval of both the N. B. A. and New York state.

The scrap, scheduled for 15 rounds, is expected to attract some 12,000 customers to Madison Square Garden.

Lesnevich was recognized as the light heavyweight ruler by the National Boxing association when he tied into Mauriello last August. That fight drew the blessing of New York's state athletic commission, since Mauriello was regarded as the outstanding challenger after Billy Conn stepped down from the 175-pound throne.

STEELHEAD, NOT CHINOOK CAUGHT

Grants Pass, Nov. 14.—(P)—Contrary to state game commission report, limit catches of salmon are not being made in the Rogue river here. Instead, limit catches of steelheads are being landed.

In the Rogue river, steelheads by law are classified as trout, and the trout season extends under stricter rules clear through January. Fishing will still be permitted, too, in February in a part of a tributary, the Illinois river.

It won't be until the following month, March, that the Chinook salmon run arrives at Caveman bridge and anglers can hope for limit catches.

KILLED ON ROAD

Lafayette, Ore., Nov. 14.—(P) State Officer W. A. Zosel said rain so obscured the vision of Arthur Kenney, Dayton, driver, that he failed to see Lesel C. Freil, 48, crossing Highway 99-W near here yesterday. Freil, a World war veteran and local business man, was killed outright.
