

USO FACILITY HERE MUST WAIT ORDER OF DEFENSE AREA

Mrs. Alfred Carpenter, Recreation Committee Chairman, Explains Procedure.

United Service Organizations cannot establish recreational centers and facilities here until or unless Medford is officially designated a defense area, Mrs. Alfred S. V. Carpenter, chairman of the recreation committee of the Jackson County Council of Defense, said today in making a public reply to numerous inquiries her committee has received. Whether Medford is ever designated as a defense area depends on whether authorization is ever given for construction of the proposed Beagle-Antelope cantonment.

Mrs. Carpenter chose today to talk about United Service Organizations because today is "recreation day" of National Defense Week. The senior high school cooperated in arranging a skit in observance of the day.

Experience Required
In reply to other questions her committee has received, Mrs. Carpenter stated that paid employees of the recreational centers being established by the United Service Organizations must be thoroughly experienced in recreational or social work and that the key employees are chosen from the six organizations that comprise U. S. O., Salvation Army, Y. M. C. A., National Catholic Community Service, Jewish Welfare Board, Y. W. C. A. and National Travelers Aid Association. To procure the latest information on the subject, Mrs. Carpenter made a trip to La Jolla, Cal., to confer with executives of the U. S. O. unit functioning there in a temporary building. A program of building U. S. O. recreational centers is now under way at a number of California cities near army camps.

Where Money Went
Mrs. Carpenter said there is not a great deal of specific information about the organization available yet because it is so new. The money raised here went into the general U. S. O. fund and this fund will be tapped for recreational centers here if and when Medford is designated a defense area, she pointed out. The U. S. O. has about \$13,500,000 to finance its operations until next June, the fund having been raised through public subscription in communities through the United States. Another fund drive is expected next June.

Nationally the U. S. O. has 757 workers in the field operating 404 units. Under construction are 167 U. S. O. buildings and contracts were let recently for 54 more. The U. S. O. has opened a large number of clubs in rented or donated buildings. The U. S. O. recently organized a new affiliate, Camp Shows, Inc., to provide camp recreation centers with the latest Broadway stage successes with professional casts.

HENHOUSE SLAYER PAYS WITH LIFE

Walla Walla, Wash., Nov. 14.—(P)—John Bruce Anderson, 58, was hanged in Washington state penitentiary last night, paying with his life for the hen house murder of his Spokane valley neighbor, David Johnson, 16 months ago.

He was pronounced dead at 12:21 a. m., 13 minutes after the trap was sprung.

A few hours before, Anderson wrote a statement in his death cell protesting his innocence of the crime for which he was to hang—shooting Johnson when the latter caught him in the act of stealing eggs—and named another man as the killer.

He was arrested in Toppenish August 28, 1940, while masquerading under Johnson's name and attempting to sell property owned by Johnson at Marshall after having had the dead man's bank account transferred to Selah.

Autoist Electrocuted By Fallen Power Wire

Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 14.—(P)—Frank Williams, 30, Vancouver, was electrocuted last night by a 2,400-volt wire, knocked down by a falling tree 10 miles north of here.

Clyde Quisenberry, who lives near the scene, aroused by the lights of a stalled car, investigated and found Williams' body. Apparently Williams stopped his car near the fallen tree and stumbled against the wire in the darkness.
