DAMAGE SUIT IN TRAFFIC SMASHUP SCHEDULED LATER

The \$21,000 personal injury suit of Waldo Green against J. N. Adams of Puyallup, Wash., originally set to open in circuit court Monday, has been ordered postponed until Monday, November 25. The action was taken because the case might be broken by Thanksgiving day on next Thursday.

The suit is based on a motorcycle-auto accident on the Pacific highway in the Siskiyou, in which Green, riding a motorcycle, sustained a broken leg and other injuries.

The complaint sets forth that Adams, in attempting to pass a truck driven by Joe Kingsley, did so without a clear view ahead, resulting in an auto driven by Ruth Coughle, stopping suddenly. Green crashed into the rear of the Coughle car and sustained a broken leg.

The plaintiff alleges negligence on the part of the defendant, Adams, in his answer, avers Green was guilty of contributory negligence, and with the exercise of due care could have stopped his motorcycle in time to avert hitting the Coughle car.

Green asks for \$20,000 general damages, and \$1,000 special damages for medical care, and loss of time from his work and business.
