News Behind The News

members could not espouse his arbitrary personal tactics. There is no evidence whatever that F. D. R. exerted any pressure. Yet even one A. F. of L. boardman's alternate voted against his own man's motion to let Lewis have his way. His position was that after hearing the case, he changed his mind because of the dictatorial behavior of the C. I. O. chief.

The closed shop had become lost in a conflict between Mr. Roosevelt and Mr. Lewis as to who was the bigger authority. When it got down to that, there was no possibility of anyone voting for Lewis except his own henchmen.

THERE was no doubt from the start about the eagerness of the army to operate the mines. Chief cause of army grousing has been the comparatively low wage of the American fighting men with the American worker. But there was a real question how it could be done. This was the first army seizure case in which reluctance of strikers to work might be expected. There is an old saying a man cannot be required to work unless he wants to.

A BURST of unseemly honesty is appearing in Italian communiques. The official prevaricators there (more commonly known as censors) are not only confirming Italian sea losses and bomb damages, but promptly. Within a few hours after the heavy sinkings in the Mediterranean, Rome confirmed the figures and in one case seemed to surpass the British claims. Up to then, it was the

unbroken Mussolini custom to laugh off British damage and then confirm about 50 percent of it two weeks later.

Obviously something has happened, and more than an inkling of what it is has reached here. Three-cornered internal trouble between the Italian political regime, the army and the navy has come to a higher head. The politicians blame both services for failing to fight as well as they promised, and truth is emerging from the mixup.

But similarly the censors in Berlin have somewhat loosened their restrictions upon American reporters. Details of German difficulties as to food, clothing, the Russian campaign, etc. are being revealed in recent Berlin dispatches. A year ago a censor who passed such things would have been shot.

The two developments together are advisedly accepted at this end as a forerunner of an axis peace proposal.

New York, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Hopes for a labor armistice, especially in the coal field where a threatened shutdown menaced defense steel production, today helped the stock market get back on the upgrade.

The conference called at the White House between steel and union heads touched off a rallying trend in the forenoon that advanced leaders fractions to more than 2 points. Bonds and commodities revived.

Tax selling persisted to a lesser degree. International developments were without particularly stimulating qualities. The news that U. S. marines would be withdrawn from China again stressed far eastern tension and kept some customers in the conservative ranks.
